

Calapooia Round-up Is Big Event Over Week-End

Wild West Show Will Attract Many Thousands

Lebanon—The 23rd annual Calapooia round-up, a wild west show which has attracted thousands of spectators from all parts of the valley in past years, is scheduled Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the grounds just west of Crawfordville. Contestants from all parts of the state have made entry, and sponsors of the exhibition promise an event fully if not more entertaining than those offered before. Stock of cattle and wild horses has been secured chiefly from eastern Oregon.

The program is launched each day at 10 a.m. The program includes musical chair events, bareback riding, bucking contests, cowboy races, relay races, wild cow milking, chariot races, track races and Roman races. Added features of entertainment include sharpshooting, juggling and clown acts.

Queen of this year's affair is Doris Orndoff of Crawfordville. She will be crowned in ceremonies beginning at 1:30 o'clock.

Motorists Fail To Heed Stop Signs, Albany

Albany—Chief of Police Perry Stelcher revealed today that a number of complaints had been made at police headquarters that automobile drivers are ignoring stop signs along the new Pacific highway right-of-way on Eighth street and eastward, and that consequently the danger of accidents is constant.

The chief danger, however, lies in failure of motorists to stop on the Jackson street approach, before crossing the Southern Pacific main line track, Stelcher declared.

Newly constructed concrete abutments which conceal view of the trains which, as a rule, are coming at a rapid speed at this point obscure the crossing from the view of drivers, he added, making it doubly dangerous when the car operators approach this particular crossing. This right-of-way is not yet a public thoroughfare, the local police chief said, and persons who use it as such are doing so at their own risk.

Damage Action Filed
Albany—John Maxwell has filed suit here for \$500 damages against the Houck Construction company, charging that the latter injured his property on Cox street by excavation and placing of pipe lines between the Pacific highway and the Southern Pacific railway along the west bank of the creek.

The suit, which is naming T. L. Houck, member of the firm as defendant, has arisen from work done by the company in connection with a drainage project constructed below the narrow pit on the Cox creek, from which gravel and dirt are being taken for use in filling approaches to the new Albany highway overhead crossing.

Maxwell charges that his property has been damaged by the ditching, fluming and piping, all of which was done without his knowledge or consent.

Stone Quarry Development Gives Promise

Silverton—Carl Thorkildson, stone mason, and J. E. Hoemer, local real estate dealer, are developing an interesting stone quarry on the former Edgar Hobart farm of which Harold Toft is the present owner, and the two men have arranged by lease contract for the project. The quarry is two miles southeast of Silverton, bordering the west edge of Evans Valley.

The stone is a formation of sedimentary deposit from springs or streams and is known as calcareous tufa. The rock is of the finest kinds of volcanic detritus and is definitely stratified.

In color the stone is of a light tan body streaked and mottled with shades of dark tan to deep red and bronze. Certain deposits have a coppery and blue tinge.

The formation is in large cubical shapes and cleavage runs vertical as though the cubes had been tilted half over. The cubes are easily removed from the quarry with a crowbar after the surface trees, loose rocks and dirt have been disposed of. They are easily split along the lines of cleavage.

Mr. Thorkildson has a picturesque outdoor fireplace at his West Hill home constructed from the formation and the R. A. Fishes have an indoor fireplace made of the material at their summer cottages along the Abique.

Mr. Hoemer stated that Salem and Portland patrons had pronounced the rock of the finest quality for building and fireplace construction.
