Permits and estimated totals for new dwelling houses, for the first six months of this year, made a new high record for the first half of the year, the city building inspector's office reported yesterday. Commercial construction, however, fell short of the normal level.

Permits for new dwelling houses totaled 155, aggregating in estimated cost \$380,680. This was an increase of approximately 50 per cent over the corresponding period for 1938 when 94 permits aggregating a cost of \$247,172 were issued.

Only 47 permits of commercial nature were issued for the first half of this year, aggregating \$464,885. In 1938 the first six months showed a total of \$1,171,915.

During June 79 permits of all kinds were issued, the estimated cost being \$86,349. Of these 28 were for dwellings to cost \$76,385.

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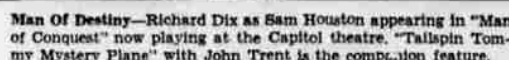
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Mt. Angel—The National Benedictine Education association completed its work of three days last night. Abbot Alcuin Deutsch, O.S.B., of St. John's university, Minn., was elected

president, Father Clement Frank, O.S.B., registrar of Mt. Angel college, held the interest of the delegates in the morning session yesterday when he discussed very frankly and constructively the program of teacher training for the Benedictine schools in the United States.

Father Clement in frequent quotations, gave proof of his familiarity with the modern literature on educational methods and teacher training. He quoted from the Encyclical of Pope Pius XI "Christian Education of Youth" and showed how the late pope realized the educational problems in the various countries in our day. Pope Pius XI said "Perfect schools are the result not so much of good methods as of good teachers, teachers who are thoroughly prepared and well grounded in the matters they have to teach; who possess the intellectual and moral convictions required by their important office; who cherish a pure and holy love for the youth confided to them and who are of the Jesus Christ and His Church, of which these are the children of predilection, and who have, therefore, sincerely at heart the true good of family and country."

Father Clement pointed out that Benedictine monastic life provides ideal environment for teachers and teacher training. He emphasized that Benedictine schools must continue to preserve the traditions of the past, give needed guidance in the confusing problems of today, and offer principles of action acceptable to our youth can plan their future in a world that satisfy intellectual ambitions and convictions of Christian morality.

The last session of the convention heard Father Sylvester Schmits, O. S. B., professor of education at St. Benedict's college, Atchison, Kans., discuss the present confusion in methods and ideals of higher educational institutions in the United States. He said that there were those who demanded a college education—quality and quantity not destined—for every American boy and

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
