

# Polk County Methods of Irrigation Interest Farmers of Valley

## Various Types Of Systems to Be Inspected

Dallas—The Polk county irrigation tour is to be held next Monday and Tuesday. It might be somewhat out of order to call this year's series of meetings a tour because in reality it will be a series of meetings to study different types of irrigation equipment and types of crops and uses of irrigation.

It is contemplated that there will be an opportunity to observe systems with shallow lifts and one operating under a head of 100 feet which is somewhat a record in the Willamette valley.

High pressure sprinklers and flood irrigation will be observed. At one stop, according to W. C. Leth, Polk county agent, who is arranging the tour, there will be an opportunity to observe a new low pressure type of stationary sprinkler head which is on the market this year for the first time and is a very recent development.

Irrigation of potatoes and other truck crops, small fruits, hay and pastures will no doubt be the uses to which irrigation water is put at the contemplated stops.

Most of the farms to be visited will be those on which new projects have been established recently. Owing to the fact that the first of this week was a holiday period, it has been difficult to definitely get the various stops scheduled completely before going to press time. A letter is being sent out from the Polk county agent's office to all of the farmers in the county telling more in detail about the proposed schedule and about the various systems that will be visited. Anyone not on the regular mailing list may inquire at the office of Leth concerning the schedule or the schedule will be sent to anyone requesting it.

## Prison Terms Handed Four

Albany—Fred Hutcherson was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary on a charge of larceny from an automobile Wednesday by Circuit Court Judge L. H. McMahon, when he convened court to hear pleas of six persons who were charged with felonies.

Charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, Claud Risley was also sentenced to the state penitentiary, his offense involving the passing of bad checks here recently.

Grant Allen, who was arrested with Risley, was also sentenced to one year, but was paroled by Judge McMahon, who explained that after carefully delving into their case, he was confident that Risley was the ringleader of their activities.

Ernest Victor Downing was sent to the penitentiary for one year, after being arraigned on a charge of larceny from a service station last week-end, his penance being the result of a non-support charge, however, with the sentence on the larceny charge being withheld.

Robert Farmer, Philomath, and Andrew Tribue, Springfield, were arraigned each on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, but the court continued sentences. The two remain in the county jail for lack of \$100 bond.

A similar charge against Roy Farmer was transferred to juvenile court when it was learned that he was under 18 years of age.

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## Lebanon Tax Matters Take Council Time

Lebanon—An ordinance levying assessments against taxpayers whose homes border the recently completed new Carolina street sewer was a major matter in a long meeting of the Lebanon city council in the city hall Wednesday night. The bill was laid over for further study after it passed its second reading.

Another ordinance postponed to third reading in the next council meeting was one which proposes to license, tax and regulate rooms and places where games with playing cards are operated.

The council gave tentative approval to a report of the street committee outlining new routes for loaded logging trucks plying to local mills or passing through to Albany. The new routes are designed to keep the heavy trucks off paved streets not constructed with view to such heavy traffic and also to relieve traffic congestion.

A suggestion that the city install its own gas pump and tank was referred by Mayor T. W. Munyan to the ways and means committee for investigation.

Grade Still Slippery
