

Women Have Hard Fight Novelist Says

Kansas City, Mo., July 13 (AP)—Women will have to fight harder to retain their right to work in industry than they did to obtain suffrage, Margaret Cushman Banning, the novelist, told the convention of the Federation of Professional and Business Women's clubs, and today women from coast to coast agreed.

"This is going to be a battle for livelihood and it will be the kind of a fight in which men are not likely to be gallant, or even just," Mrs. Banning said.

Elizabeth Curry of Boston, Mass., warned that not all the opposition to married women holding jobs would come from the men. In Massachusetts, where laws restricting employment of married women were held unconstitutional, single women "were the chief opponents of the right of married women to work," she said.

Earlene White of Washington, D. C., president of the federation, said many of the bills introduced in 21 state legislatures had been fostered by bachelors. She suggested that the women see that these "men marry and have wives to change their point of view."

Boston, July 13 (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt has rejected a challenge to debate the question of "working wives" in public jobs with the president of the Massachusetts women's political club, it was revealed today.

The club's president, Miss Florence Birmingham, said Mrs. Roosevelt had rejected the challenge issued last month on grounds that "nothing would be gained" by such a debate. Miss Birmingham's group has organized a state-wide campaign to ban "working wives" from such jobs.

"It's been the wealthy women who don't have to work who have led the movement to take women out of their proper sphere of the home," Miss Birmingham said.

"The outstanding example of this is Mrs. Roosevelt herself."

Dave Beck Doubts Third Term Wisdom

Centralla, Wash., July 13 (AP)—The wisdom of endorsing President Roosevelt for a third term and putting the Washington State Federation of Labor "in any political vest pocket" was criticized Wednesday by Dave Beck, western organizer for the Teamsters' union.

In an address before the federation's 38th annual convention, Beck declared:

"Some delegates are advocating a third term for President Roosevelt. I want to warn you that under no circumstances should labor in this state be put in a position where any party or politician can say he's got the state federation in his vest pocket."
