

Woodburn Launches Annual Community Fair Plans

Late September Dates Selected By Directors

Woodburn—The Woodburn fair board, under the chairmanship of John W. Ramage, met at the First National bank to lay first plans for the coming 1939 fair. Definite date for the fair was set for September 29 and 30, these dates falling on Friday and Saturday.

All indications show that 1939 will have the biggest community fair yet given in Woodburn. The fair board early in the spring of the year contacted the granges that have been exhibiting their products during the past seasons and received an enthusiastic response to their queries. Exhibits this year should be outstanding in their quality and quantity.

Amusement for the general public will be far better than before. Many of last year's highlights will be returned along with new and additional entertainment. Old pictures of Woodburn residents and the community are to be again exhibited. Many residents of the city have expressed their willingness to donate pictures for this exhibit that were not on display last year. The board is studying the feasibility of having commercial exhibitors at the 1939 fair. Special housing will be arranged and an entire section will be given to those firms desiring to rent space and display their products. The hobby show promises to be much larger and more complete for this year's exhibit. It is contemplated that both the hobby show and the old-time pictures will be given special rooms to themselves.

Flood Control Project Outlined for Lebanon

M'Kay Paints Word Picture Of Possibility

Lebanon—Possibilities of increased production and development in this section if the \$60,000,000 Willamette valley project becomes a reality, were outlined in a word picture given to Lebanon Lions this Thursday noon by Douglas McKay, state senator from Salem.

McKay, long identified with political life of the valley, is president of a group organized informally to promote the gigantic flood control and river improvement project which already has received the approval and some appropriation from the national administration.

McKay admitted considerable opposition to the project and intimated that if the people of that area were not in favor of the project, the South Santiam dam would probably be left out of the program.

Linn Special Election Costs Are Released

Albany—Cost of the special people's utility district election held July 11 was \$1314.21, it was reported Thursday by R. M. Russell, county clerk.

It was explained by the clerk that this figure includes only items chargeable directly against the election, and does not include such costs as the extension of the extra charge on the tax rolls and in tax statements.

Largest single item in the total was paid to judges and clerks, who received \$733.70, according to the report.

The county assessor is now confronted with the problem of distributing the amount among the taxpayers of the proposed district, a problem which, he explained, is complicated by the fact that it is somewhat less than a tenth of a mill.

Court Inspects Highway

Albany—Members of Linn county court who made a complete inspection of the South Santiam highway Wednesday reported yesterday that completion of the highway should be accomplished in about six weeks.

The members of the court traversed the entire route of the south road to its junction with the North Santiam road with the exception of a short distance, on the Colonial Construction company project.

This section was detoured via a side road connecting with the old Seven Mile hill road, which constitutes the only outlet for normal traffic crossing on the South Santiam route.

The Leonard & State contract will be completed in all probability within six weeks and the Colonial job may be finished within a month, the commissioners and judge found.
