

Flax Festival Plans Completed at Mt. Angel This Week

Floral Parade Will Be Feature Of Celebration

Mt. Angel—Final plans for the fourth annual Oregon Flax Festival, August 18 to 20, were discussed Thursday night at a special meeting of committee chairmen called by A. W. Holmes, general chairman and president of the Flaxarians, group in charge of this year's celebration.

It was announced that 26 local floats have already been signed up for the grand floral and industrial parade, one of the major events on the festival program, besides a large number of out-of-town entries. All the committees are functioning splendidly to make the celebration a big success.

Acceptances to participate in the parade have already been received from the Independence Hop Bowl and the Eugene Radicals, and it is expected that many other marching groups, drum corps and bands will be here for the event.

The program for the three-day affair has been completed and was outlined at the meeting. Friday night, August 18, the queen coronation ceremonies will take place, followed by the Queen's Ball in the auditorium.

Saturday morning at 10:30 will feature a Kiddies' Pet parade and a sports program has been arranged for the afternoon, which will feature an amateur polo match and will include various foot races, handicapped races and tug-o-war. Saturday night a Salem theatre guild will present a play.

The floral and industrial parade, one of the highlights of the fete, has been scheduled for Sunday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. The concluding event of the celebration will be a mammoth fireworks display through the courtesy of Al Wickert and Fred Stolle, local representatives of the Shell Oil company, on Sunday night.
