

Parole System Outlined for Valley Rotary Clubs

Finsley Speaks On Supervision At Joint Meeting

Albany—The parole system is a part of the criminal picture and is designated as an aid to rather than an impediment in the way of law enforcement and observation, Fred Finsley, newly named director of paroles and probation, told Albany and Salem Rotarians at a joint meeting of the two clubs in Albany Friday at luncheon at the Hotel Albany.

The speaker expressed the opinion that while it is probably true that some parolees might be released without supervision, supervision is needed if the released man gives any evidence of causing further trouble.

The parole problem is not one merely of three men on a board, but it is a problem of society, Finsley stated.

"In dealing with prisoners, all of society must help to rehabilitate them through the finding of employment, and the understanding of their problems," Finsley said.

Appearing on the musical part of the program were Flavia Downs and Erwin Potter, both of Salem.

James Wilson, of the Salem club, introduced the speaker and program numbers.

Tucker in Tolls

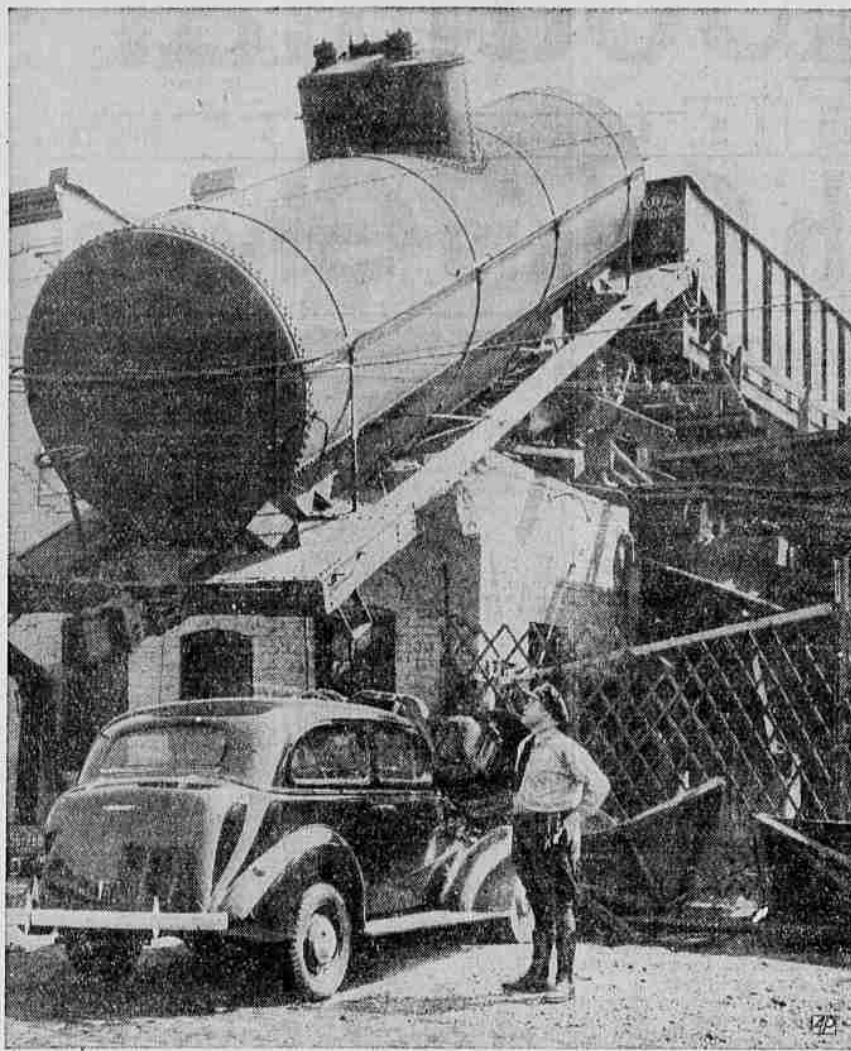

Sorghum Cooking to Start at Silverton

Evergreen—With the feel of fall in the morning air, the Walter G. Klopfensteins are making final plans for the sorghum harvest and cooking at the new location of the mill in this section. Aden Klopfenstein of the Brush Creek district sold his interest to his brother and the mill that has been in use each autumn for the past six years at the Aden Klopfenstein home, has been moved to the brother's home and greatly improved.

The continuous warm weather is just what the sorghum cane needs, though a good rain would do no harm to the crop, it was reported Thursday from the Klopfensteins. Accelerated seed was furnished many growers by the owners of the mill for early summer planting and as a result the run of first class sorghum promises to yield around 2000 gallons of steamed-cooked syrup.

Miss Rachel Klopfenstein of Silverton is a business partner of her brother. The family "knows its sorghum" from childhood as this was the business of their father and their grandfather in Indiana, and their father helped establish the mill in the Silverton community. The runs of former years have turned out very satisfactory with an improvement each year as seed was experimented with in becoming properly adapted to the valley and western climate, and other conditions learned and reckoned with. This season has every indication of quality and yield as the definite establishing of sorghum as a comparatively new industry for western Oregon.

Cooking will begin not earlier than September 25, Klopfenstein stated, which will be as soon as the pruned drying is completed on their place.

Hayesville School Principal Resigns

It is with regret that the board announces the resignation of Mrs. Lillian Shaner, primary instructor for six years. She will be succeeded by Mrs. H. Sewage System Work Approved

Silverton—The award to Soule and Walters of Elma, Wn., for the construction of unit No. 2 of the sewage system, a PWA project, by the Silverton city council with \$13-324 consideration, has been approved by the Public Works administration. Certain deductions were necessary from the first consideration.

The work is mainly the extension of the out-fall sewer by laying 4000 feet of pipe to make additional connections with existing sewer lines. The principal project, a \$62,000 proposition, was begun last December, and is said to be about three-fourths complete.

Finished and in place are the sewage tank and machinery and sludge pump.

The entire project is to be finished by the middle of October.
