Monmouth—Mrs. Grace Lentz has in her possession a copy of an old newspaper relating events of 21 years ago next November when the armistice was signed. The paper, the State Journal, Lansing, Mich., of November 11, 1918, displays a prominent picture of the Kaiser on the front page. The caption reads: "Facing Murder Trial." Included in the terms of peace is the turning over of 160 submarines, 50 destroyers, six battleships. The paper announced the stopping of draft calls affecting 300,000 men in this country.

The plaintiff asks that the marriage be dissolved, that the care and custody of the child be awarded the plaintiff although she is willing that the child see his father at such times as the court may determine, and for such other relief as to the court may seem just.

College Opens September 20
