### 79 Sacks of U. S. Mail Lost at Sea

Washington, Sept. 21 (AP)—The postoffice department announced Wednesday that 79 sacks of United States mail were lost when the Belgian steamship Alex Van Opstal struck a mine and sank the night of September 15.

The steamer left New York September 6, carrying American mail addressed to Antwerp, Ostend and Brussels, Belgium, and to Luxembourg and the Belgian Congo. All mail addressed to these points which reached New York between September 2 and 20, is believed to have been lost.
