D.A.R. Plans Dedication Sunday

Chemeketa chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, will dedicate a marker at the site of the Jefferson Institute in Polk county Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The site of the Institute is on La Creole creek, a few miles west of Rickreall. The public is invited.

A two-room log building was built on the site by the first pioneer settlers in 1845-46 on the Carey D. Embrey donation land claim between Rickreall and Dallas on the first Crossroad west of Rickreall leading to the Monmouth highway.

In this building was held the first academic schooling in Polk county with John E. Lyle the teacher. The first county court and circuit court were also held in this building and religious services of all denominations were held there from time to time.

Col. Cornelius Gilliam also recruited a company of volunteers from this site to assist in quelling the Indians at the time of the Indian massacres.
