

Lebanon Legion Harvest Jubilee Plans Completed

Nine Seeking Title of Queen For Big Event

Lebanon—With the naming of nine princesses from as many elementary schools of this area as candidates for queen, the local American Legion post is in readiness for the annual harvest jubilee Saturday, and issues a cordial invitation to all to attend the day's program which starts at 11 o'clock and winds up with the free harvest ball late in the evening.

The candidates are Charlene Bryant, Gore; Viola Crenshaw, Sweet Home; Mollie Hewett, Queen Anne; Lebanon; Betty Frank, Lebanon north school; Lucille Dempsey, Sodaville; Dixie Lee Walkinshaw, Tennessee; Helen Jo Gilbert, Berlin; Lorene Wise, Crowfoot; and Maxine Gott, Waterloo. From among them will be selected a queen in private judging, with the others making up the royal court.

The queen will be crowned by Judge George Rossman of Salem at 2 o'clock on the platform, after which Judge Rossman will make an address. He will be introduced by Mayor T. W. Munyan.

The first event on the day's program is the Sweet Home-Lebanon walkathon starting at 11 o'clock from Sweet Home. At noon the several exhibits will open, and at 1:30 o'clock the children's pet parade is scheduled. In this the Lebanon and Sweet Home bands will march as will the two grade school and drum corps.

Following the queen ceremony, the crown band of Salem will give an entertainment, and the program, of about two hours' duration, will conclude with a pie eating contest. The free dance will start at 9:00.

Pedestrian walks at the county bridge now in course of construction to span Thomas creek on Main street claimed serious attention of the council at the recent meeting. Original estimates for the work in cement were placed around \$1,200, it was stated. Board walks would be less expensive but also less permanent, it was pointed out. Cement construction was favored by council members and the matter was taken under advisement for decision and action in the near future.

G. S. Barbian, who is connected with the bridge work here, stated to the council that, inasmuch as recent high water removed the temporary foot crossing near the new bridge, some means of crossing could be effected even before completion of the highway bridge.

Temporary use of the big bridge for pedestrians during construction was not advised by Barbian, who stated that in event of accident on an improvised temporary crossing the contractors did not feel that they should be required to defend a damage suit.

As now contemplated, a walk about 4 1/2 feet wide on either side of the bridge will be constructed. The main crossing will not be completed for several weeks, it was said. Pedestrians have used a temporary crossing but autumn rains have swept it away and a similar fate awaits any other temporary structure, it was explained.

Report of the budget committee as prepared some time ago was adopted by the council. This provides for \$2,120 for running expenses, interest, bonds, etc. for the calendar year 1940. Although official notice to interested taxpayers had been given of proposed action on the budget at the meeting no one appeared either with objection or approval. The only two members of the six man budget committee present were M. D. Zander, president, and E. D. Myers, secretary. The amount budgeted is \$120 in excess of the current year's budget.
