

Narrow Route Now Replaced By Better One

Detroit—The work of re-locating an adequate road to replace the narrow, winding one now in use from Detroit to Niagara, has been completed and M. L. Harshberger, local engineer, and Marshall Farmer, timekeeper, and their assistants in the project have gone on to a new job at Seeley Lake, Mont. M. C. Koehler, office engineer, had already been transferred to the Crater Lake project.

The agency in charge of the re-location was the new Federal Works Agency of the public roads administration.

The re-locating of this road, which is the beginning work on the North Santiam unit of the Willamette valley project, was started the middle of July. The appropriation for it was \$500,000.

The proposed new road, starting at the CCC camp and coming out at Niagara, will be a very outstanding route, 12.5 miles in length, eliminating the sharp curves of the present road and capable of caring for the heavy traffic which is bound to pass over it.

The reason for building the road is the proposed construction of a flood control dam, about 4.5 miles downstream from Detroit, which will be 400 feet high and will spell the doom of Detroit as the lake thus created will extend a mile above the present town site, and at this point will be a mile and a quarter wide.

It is understood that some of the better buildings will be moved to the new town. However, no one is worrying over that now, as it is expected it will take at least three years for the dam to be built.

Besides locating the road the agency made the bridge surveys over the Breitenbush river and the principal creeks. Some work yet to be finished will be done by local men under the supervision of John McGilvary.

Sweet Home Budget Requirement Doubled

Sweet Home—Due to improvements already completed and new ones contemplated to keep pace with the rapid growth of this city, the 1940 budget, subject to the approval of taxpayers, October 24, calls for total expenditures of \$14,400, which is more than twice the aggregate in the current year. The budget estimates an income of \$4,800, leaving a balance of \$9,600 to be raised by taxation.

Among reasons for the increase are the newly installed water system, a fire department organized this year, and payment of the city's share in improvements to streets and sidewalks undertaken with WPA assistance. With several projects of this nature completed, the city intends launching another \$25,000 program providing the budget meets approval.
