

Formal Decree Filed in Winslow Reinstatement

Formal decree was filed in circuit court here today by Judge Archie Walker of McMinnville confirming his memorandum opinion of last week in the case of Frank Winslow vs. Frank Minto, chief of police of Salem, in which the chief is directed to reinstate Winslow on the Salem police force. Winslow was discharged in September, 1938, on allegations of brutality in enforcing the arrest of one George Stallings.

The mandatory portion of the decree filed today to enforce the writ of mandamus reads: "It is hereby ordered, adjudged and decreed that a writ of mandamus be ordered to the defendant commanding him to reinstate the plaintiff as a member of the Salem police force, to reinstate the said plaintiff to the position he formerly occupied on the police force and to permit the said plaintiff to resume his duties as a member of said police force and to certify his name to the proper authorities so that he will draw his compensation as fixed by the ordinances of the city of Salem for such services."

The memorandum opinion made no reference to compensation and there has been some discussion as to whether Winslow will be entitled to full pay during the interval he was off the police force since September, 1938. While reference is made in the formal decree as to compensation those who have examined it say it still leaves that question open, although ordering that Winslow shall "draw his compensation as fixed by the ordinances of the city of Salem for such services."

About the same time that the peremptory writ was served on Chief Minto this morning Winslow appeared at police headquarters and told the chief he was ready to go to work. The chief refused to put him on pending a decision by the city council on the recommendation of the civil service commission that the case be appealed. The commission advised Minto not to put Winslow to work before the council has considered the matter.

Training School For Sailors

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The coast guard today placed all of its maritime training facilities and a new 1,000-man camp at the disposal of American sailors beached by the neutrality law.

Rear Admiral R. R. Waesche, coast guard commandant, ordered training schools at New York, New London, Conn., and Alameda, Cal., not to enroll any more men for training unless they were seamen who had lost their jobs when the neutrality law stopped American shipping to the war zone.

He also notified officials in Boston to proceed "immediately" to set up a new training station at Gallop's Island in Boston harbor with accommodations for 1,000 additional recruits.

Waesche's orders followed President Roosevelt's announcement last week he would seek relief for the beached sailors.

While in the training schools, the sailors will receive food, shelter, clothing, transportation and at least \$36 in cash per month.

Corvallis, Nov. 13 (AP)—The first Oregon State College football team to extend victories over the University of Oregon to four in a row had the student body at its feet today.

President George W. Peavy listened to demands for a holiday and ordered a cessation of activities between 3 p. m. and 6 p. m. Cheering undergraduates immediately organized a free rally dance "honoring Eberle Schultz, captain of last Saturday's victorious team."

There was a noisy demonstration on the campus last night when rumors were afoot there would be a second invasion of Eugene to avenge the ill-fated foray two years ago. Oregon State students swarmed into Eugene in 1937 on the Monday following the Beavers' triumph over the Webfoots but were ousted rather ingloriously.

The three-hour celebration was proposed by Bob Hirstel, Portland, president of the inter-fraternity council, Henry Pavelek, Woodburn, president of the Independent Council, and Leonard Rice of Grants Pass, president of the men's hall, apparently to forestall a march on Eugene.

"I had hoped the campus had reached the place where it was able to take these things in stride, but I guess I'm mistaken," commented Dr. Peavy.

Political Truce Ended as Plans Announced

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Open campaigning by Garner-for-president boosters and republican discussion of a short intensive drive for the presidency set the 1940 political ball rolling today, ending the truce which prevailed during the neutrality debate.

A prediction the Republican National committee would give serious consideration to limit of its major campaign to eight or nine weeks came from Senator McNary of Oregon, the minority floor leader. Under such a plan, the presidential nominee and party orators probably would not begin their speech-making until September.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), a potential candidate for the presidential nomination, has expressed the belief a rapid-fire campaign through September and October would be better than one started in July which might lag in late summer.

The plan also would permit the republicans to hold their national convention later than the customary June session, if they desire. There has been some talk of delaying the convention until the democrats choose their nominees.

An assertion Vice President Garner would be a presidential democratic candidate, no matter whether President Roosevelt might seek a third term, was made by E. R. Germany, director of the Garner forces. Garner is in the race to win, said Germany, adding: "We have no interest in political trade." He disclosed organizations to support the vice president's candidacy were being formed in every state.

Garner has been at his home in Uvalde, Tex., since the special session of congress adjourned. He has made no public statement as to his candidacy, but the Dallas News said that, barring a change in plans, he would announce later this month that he would accept the nomination.

Court Sidesteps Decision on Atlanta Coal

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—An attack by Atlanta, Ga., on constitutionality of the 1937 bituminous coal act was dismissed today by the Supreme Court on the ground the city "has no standing to maintain the suit."

In addition the tribunal: Agreed to review a circuit court decision directing the Falk corporation of Milwaukee to withdraw recognition from an independent union but leaving the way open for the employees to choose that organization in a subsequent election as their collective bargaining agency. The labor board contended the circuit court had exceeded its authority.

In a brief order, the tribunal held Atlanta "has no standing to maintain the suit."

It affirmed a judgment against the city by the federal district court for the District of Columbia. Atlanta had contended price fixing provisions of the legislation, to be placed in effect soon, would require it to pay a higher price for coal and this would be an unconstitutional interference with the performance of "essential governmental functions."

When the case came before the court on November 7, Chief Justice Hughes stopped argument after he and his associates had expressed doubt the tribunal would have jurisdiction until the city was actually damaged by the legislation.

The law, intended to stabilize the bituminous coal industry, was passed as a substitute for the 1935 Guffey act declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.
