Numcheff Jailed for Rush Act on Bank

Mt. Angel, Nov. 21.—Charged with obtaining money by false pretenses, in which police say he used the rush act on banks, Mike Numcheff of Forest Grove was bound over to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing here today. He was sent to Salem and lodged in the county jail when he failed to make bail in the amount of \$2500.

His method, said the police, was to go hurriedly into a bank, call the banker by his first name, and ask for a small loan for some purpose that needed immediate attention. He succeeded in obtaining \$30 from the Bank of Mt. Angel where he used the name of C. E. Thomas on August 21, but similar attempts made at Woodburn and St. Paul were failures because the bankers wouldn't accommodate him.

Snow Removal Santiam Road

Members of the county court appeared before the state highway commission today and discussed the matter of snow removal on the North Santiam highway, whether or not it will be kept up this year to be determined at a meeting of the court to be held later. The commission made the proposal that the state would keep the road clear from the junction east and the county and federal government to the west. A similar arrangement was made last year with the understanding also that in event the snow became too heavy west of the junction for the lighter county and federal equipment the state would send in its heavy equipment to care for it, the county reimbursing the state for such expense. The county had the privilege of withdrawing at any time when the expense was considered too great.

Judge Slegmund expressed himself as favorable to keeping the road open but no official action will be taken until the court as a whole can discuss it.

State laws provide that where a legislative vacancy occurs the secretary of state shall call a meeting of the county court or courts in the district for the selection of a successor.

3 Salem Fires Set by Chehalis Arsonists

Evidence uncovered in Salem indicates that three fires that broke out at intervals of a few minutes during an American Legion parade last August 11 may have been set by Fred Stine and Robert Walzer, now doing long prison terms at Walla Walla for confessed arson in the state of Washington.

Women employed at the Cozy Cafe on the north side of Ferry street, between Liberty and High, say that, from newspaper pictures, they have positively identified the two men as having been in Salem at the time of the American Legion convention and at other times. They ate meals there when in Salem and during the day left their packs at the cafe. One of the women clearly remembers, she said, having seen the name Robert Walzer on one of the packs.

Stine and Walzer admitted setting fires in Oregon and Washington totaling damage of about \$20,000. No Salem fires were included in the list they furnished authorities in the state of Washington, but their statements indicated that not all of their fires were on the list.

Stine, 47-years-old, claimed Rochester, N. Y., as his home, and Walzer, 23, said he was from Rome, N. Y.

Sheriff and tax collector's records: Tax turnover not made each week as required by law. Sheriff's legal and criminal department has received small fees for permits to carry concealed weapons which were not turned into the treasurer, but understood to have been used in paying for blank forms used for permits. Sheriff has in instances rendered service in civil cases without collecting fees in advance, a total of \$1,044.61 showed in uncollected fees of which only \$279.30 was for services in 1938.

In the surveyor's office it is cited no permanent record of fees received has been kept and one is recommended. In connection with the circuit court it is cited the reporter collects and retains the fees for that work, and on certain days the fees amount to more than the \$10 a day allowed by law. The audit says that maps in the assessor's office are in very bad condition, some of them being over 45 years old and should be replaced. The report cites that certain moneys were received and disbursed by employes without clearance through the treasurer's office.

The report shows \$1277 assessed in fines in justice courts outside of Salem but not collected. In the Salem justice court the report says that in 376 criminal cases where costs were taxed against defendants collections were made in only 264 cases. The report cites cases it says money was received and presumably paid out by justice courts without being entered in the cash book.

The report also shows in a general way that the budget estimate for 1938 was \$1,063,738.86, that total receipts were \$1,473,571.43 or \$409,832.67 over the budget which was due to failure to set up cash balances correctly and because no estimates were made of several special revenue funds.

The report cites that in the tax collector's office there was a difference of \$477.65 not accounted for but a special audit has been ordered to cover this and it will be more fully explained when the special audit report is filed.

The report cites that instances were noted where cash advances were made to the same employe from more than one office at the same time and that there were instances where employes had advances in excess of their accrued or earned salary.

The reference to Venlo, on the Dutch frontier, recalled a sensational but mysterious shooting there more than a week ago when a Dutch secret agent was "killed and several persons—some English speaking—were seized by gестаapo agents who dashed across the frontier and carried them back into Germany.

Berlin, Nov. 21 (AP)—Two leaders of the British intelligence service in Europe were captured November 9 when they attempted to cross the German border into The Netherlands, an official announcement said tonight.

The capture was made at Venlo, where Netherlands dispatches on that night reported a shooting incident and the capturing of occupants of a Netherlands automobile who were taken into Germany.

The men were identified as "Best" and as "Captain Stevens" the statement said they were overpowered and taken prisoner by state police.

It added "contradictory claims whether they were captured while still in Holland or when in Germany are at present being examined."

National Parks Viewed with Alarm

W. H. Tucker, Aberdeen banker and member of the Washington state planning commission, conferred here today with Gov. Charles A. Sprague on a protest against the formation of "backyard" national parks.

Tucker, a boyhood friend of the governor, was en route to San Francisco to confer with former President Herbert Hoover and Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Leland Stanford university, on the protest.

The San Francisco meeting was prompted by the numerous small national parks now under formation, or being planned, in the state of Washington.

"I view with alarm the encroachment of the national park service such as that proposed in the state of Washington," Governor Sprague told United Press.

"So far there has been no such attempt in the state of Oregon, at least nothing tangible, but there have been rumors," Sprague added.

Tucker stopped off here between trains for his conference with Sprague, who said he had no official part in the protest meeting in San Francisco.
