Willamette To Seek 8th Straight Win

Willamette university's football club, scarcely rested from a bruising reception at Caldwell last Saturday, will start east again late Wednesday afternoon. They will board a 6:32 P. M. train for their invasion of Walla Walla where they will meet the Whitman college Missionaries for the 20th consecutive time, at 1:30 p. m., Thursday.

While the Bearcats have won the last seven encounters, they still have a long way to go to pull up even with Coach Borleske's squad who took nine in a row before Willamette could stop them. The 'Cats finally broke through in 1929 with a score of 46 to 13.

Coach "Spec" Keene is admittedly worried about Thursday's engagement at Walla Walla. However, that is nothing unusual. The Bearcats took a man sized physical beating from Idaho last Saturday although they won the ball game 13 to 7. George McGillem, driving halfback, is not expected to take part in the Missionary game due to a shoulder injury.

An unusual feature of Willamette-Whitman football contests is the fact that the two clubs have never played a tie game during their series of 19. The closest was back in 1924 when Whitman won 7 to 6. The scores over the 19 year period:

If Oregon State does win from UCLA, Southern California must win its last two league games for the championship because of the 7-7 tie Oregon shoved down Troy's throat on the first day of the season. A loss by USC would give the Beavers the title by the margin of that tie.

Webfoots to Open Basket Season

Eugene, Ore., Nov. 4.—The University of Oregon's varsity basketball squad will open defense of its varied assortment of titles, conference, regional and national, here at McArthur court on November 25 against Southern Oregon College of Education. The game will mark the start of a 31 game schedule for Coach Howard Hobson's colorful and fast-stepping quintet. After three preliminary games here and in Portland, the Webfoots leave on December 7 for a transcontinental tour highlighted by a second annual appearance in New York's Madison Square Garden against Long Island university.

The Webfoots are also billed to appear in New Orleans, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Detroit, Lafayette, Ind., Chicago, Macomb, Ill., and Rock Island, Ill., against outstanding collegiate and A.A.U. opponents.

Oregon State's entire hopes of gaining Rose Bowl recognition rest entirely upon the shoulders of UCLA and the University of Washington. If either of these teams should defeat the powerful Trojans, an Orange win over the Bruins Saturday would place the Beavers at the top of the conference race for the first time in history.

The Staters not only face a pair of the most dangerous backs in the conference, Jack Robinson and Kenny Washington, but are confronted with a pair of jinxes which have reigned the Beaver-Bruin football clashes for the past five years. "For since the days of the famous 'Ironmen' when Lou Stiner became head coach here, his Beavers have been unable to defeat UCLA. In fact, only once have they been able to score as many as two touchdowns.

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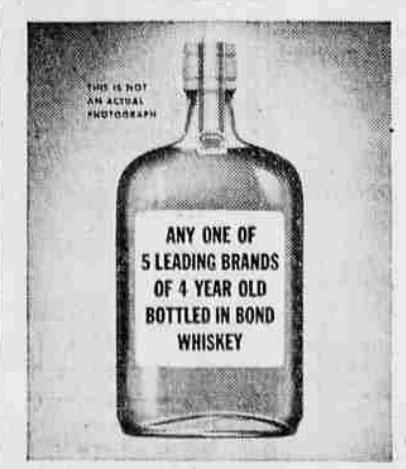
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
