Silverton—The first homecoming ever staged for the alumni of Silverton high school is completely arranged as an all-day affair Friday at the new \$155,000 building completed this fall and recently dedicated. The first class of two was graduated in 1903. E. Washburn was principal and graduates were Dick Down and Gertrude Walcott, Miss Elma Hutten, outstanding student, is chairman of plans and is to be assisted by the Pienus Vitus club which serve as guides about the rooms and places of interest in the new set-up.

Lebanon City Council Orders Street Lights

Lebanon—Erection of a number of new street lights was ordered by the city council in regular session Tuesday night. Four of the new lights are of the cluster type, and are to be installed at Park and Grant streets and at Main and Oak. Pole lights were ordered on a path to the paper mill, on East Isabella street and at the alley on Sherman between Main and Park.

The fire equipment sinking fund of \$1000, which will be set up under the new budget on January 1, is so earmarked \$300 by the decision to so increase the sum of that amount remaining over in the fire fund of the current budget.

A section of wooden sidewalk on Elmore street was condemned, and the property, owners of the adjacent property, will be asked to erect a cement walk thereon.

Signs directing north-bound logging trucks over a new route within the city were ordered to be erected at once. The new routes will relieve traffic congestion and remove heavy traffic from streets which will not stand up under such burdens.

An ordinance bill was passed assessing property owners for costs of the new sewer on Second street between D and E streets. J. K. Lott's commission as special police officer was extended one year. The street committee was instructed to study advisability of prohibiting U turns at the intersection of Ash and Main streets.
