Coaches and other directors of athletic groups do not leave players behind when they start a trek across the country unless there is some good reason for so doing. And you can bet a nice wad of Uncle Sam's folding money that the Tennessee Volunteer management cut their traveling squad to 35 because there was a perfectly good foundation for so doing. A lot of criticism has been heaped upon the powers that be back in Tennessee because they didn't bundle up every man who ever wore a helmet and transport him out to Pasadena. If those extra 15 or 18 men would have been any value to Coach Bob Neyland against the Trojans next New Year's day, you may be assured they would have been tucked away in the sleepers when the Vols hit the rails for the west coast.

With few exceptions college athletic funds are not built around the King Midas legend, although some are quite prosperous and are able to give their football heroes the finest possible line of equipment, lined shower rooms and the best in hotel accommodations. Tennessee may have a checking account which is large enough to put a big dent in Uncle Sam's buried treasure, for all we know. But the chances are the Vols have to make their dollars go just as far as the fellow who doesn't have blueprints of where he is going to get his "coffee and" next week. That hundred thousand bucks which will be poured into the coffers of the Tennesseeans may be the much needed cash to lift the mortgage off the homestead. The nuisance angle, too, enters into the decision to cut the Vol squad to 35. An additional 15 or 18 players, who know when they leave the home base that they are going just for the trip, can get into more jams than a late shopper trying to pick up a Christmas card at the dime store. It's tough to be left on the station platform waving farewells to pals who are bound for the orange groves, and rose bowls of the land of the native sons. But that's life. The fellow who brings home the bacon should get the gravy. So dry those tears and pull for the fellows who are providing the entertainment in a \$300,000 spectacle without much hope of getting a thin dime out of the proceeds.
