Submersible Turbine Proves Successful

Mt. Angel—Installation of a new type of deep well pump in the Mt. Angel academy well was recently completed. The pump is a Byron-Jackson submersible turbine, which will pump more than 300 gallons per minute from a depth of 140 feet, and deliver it under pressure to lightweight irrigation pipelines equipped with rotary sprinklers. Forty acres of ladino and alfalfa will be irrigated by the water from this well.

Unlike conventional deep well pumps, the submersible turbine has no motor above ground, no long shaft, and requires no pump house. All that can be seen above ground, as shown in the cut, is the weather-proof switch panel, and the discharge pipe. The 20 horsepower submersible motor is directly connected to the pump, with a shaft only a few feet long. Being under water, the motor is cooled more efficiently than is an air-cooled motor, and is safe from extreme summer heat, or from tampering. These pumps are designed to operate for long periods without attention, and since they do not have a long shaft and multiplicity of bearings down the column, there is no need for continual oiling.

Electric current is carried to the motor by a heavily-armored cable that is built in the same manner as submarine cables that carry electric current under rivers, and telegraph wires under the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. Two separate wraps of spring steel guard the cable from injury.

Although not the lowest in price, the submersible pump was selected by the Sisters because of its freedom from maintenance expense and high operating efficiency.

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Albany Finds Building Good

Albany—Building activities in Albany during the last year represent a total expenditure of \$113,611, according to the building permit records kept by City Recorder Karl Horton.

While this total lacks a great deal of equalling the 1938 total it compares more favorably with the 1938 total with the \$209,709 spent for construction of the new Linn county courthouse, now nearing completion, and the municipal garage and swimming pool eliminated. Without these two major projects the 1938 total would have been \$185,670.50, the recorder's book shows.

Fifteen permits for new residences at a total of \$56,450 are recorded, residential remodeling is credited with \$8,450 and assigned to commercial construction is \$34,861, while apartment house construction totaled \$11,600.
