

Coast Highway Connections Dallas Forum Topic

Mass Meeting Will Consider Present Plans

Dallas—The annual business meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held Friday noon with Oramel Stirewe, president of the forum, in charge. W. Blackley, secretary, read the financial report for the past year, prepared by August Riser, treasurer, and also submitted his own report covering the activities of the organization.

During a brief discussion on the highway situation in Polk county and the possible construction of a new stretch of road linking the present Salem-Dallas highway, from a point near Rickreall, with the Dallas-Salt Creek-Buell at a point near Salt Creek, the members decided to extend an invitation to the Rickreall community to send a delegation to meet with the Chamber Friday for the purpose of discussing the situation.

W. V. Fuller, in reviewing the forthcoming logging operations on Rickreall Creek and a possible adverse effect upon the city's future water supply, stated that the operators had shown every indication that they would co-operate to the fullest extent to prevent such a happening.

The secretary's report showed the Chamber had taken an active interest in newly made citizens in the county by honoring them as dinner guests and extending an official welcome to them and their families. The members had recognized the valuable training given boys and girls in 4-H club work by awarding five trophies for outstanding work and by entertaining all club members who had completed their work at a theatre matinee, that they had participated in helping send the debate team of the high school to San Francisco, in conducting a summer recreational program in the community and in helping send a composite band to represent the county to the state fair.

Major community activities included entering a float in the Independence hop fiesta parade and in the further development and expansion of the Christmas street decoration program.

The thanks of the Chamber was extended to C. B. Sundberg and E. J. Page for their work in connection with the Christmas decorations and for the cooperation of all who had taken part in the plan.

The treasurer's report showed the Chamber to be in good financial shape and it was turned over to the finance committee for final audit before its acceptance by the members.

Council Hears Annual Reports City Officers

Monmouth—Annual reports were received by the city council at its recent meeting. The concluding Biannual bond of \$98.20, including principal and interest, was paid off.

The treasurer's report indicated remaining obligations as follows: Water fund improvement, \$7,000; water bonds, \$54,000; general obligation bonds, \$6,000; sewer bonds, \$17,500.

The city librarian, Mrs. C. B. Reynolds, reported library hours for the year totaled 364. That 127 volumes have been added the past year to the 1,739 volumes in the library at the opening of 1939. The library circulates six periodicals; state traveling library totaled 400. In addition, the state library loaned 176 books.

In circulation the number of fiction books loaned totaled 4,073; non-fiction, 1,497; state library books, 1,045; periodicals, 1,071. Library receipts were: Balance January 1, 1939, \$155.71; city appropriation, \$290; gifts (Inez Churchill Memorial) \$5.60; fines, \$4.

Disbursements: Salaries, \$159.95; books, \$157.33; lumber and labor, \$15.05; supplies, \$17.05; binding, \$10.50; transportation of state library books, \$2.37; bank charge, 50 cents. Balance on hand, \$25.6.

The library board suggested that appointments to the board be governed by the law so that term expiration of members at different dates will give continuity to board personnel.

In harmony with the request the council made board appointments as follows: Mrs. J. S. Landers, one year; Mrs. R. B. Swenson, two years; James Tilton, three years; Miss Edna Miquas and Mrs. F. E. Barrow, four years. Mrs. H. W. Morison, who has been board secretary since its organization, declined further service.

Murder Case Before Court

Albany—Rufus A. Stults, who is being held in the Lun county jail, awaiting a hearing on a charge of murder, will be taken before Justice of the Peace Victor Oliver Monday for completion of his preliminary hearing. District Attorney Harlow Wetrick announced Saturday.

It is alleged that Stults beat Alex "Deaf" Harju to death in a fight December 14. Harju's body was found lying in a ditch, two miles south of Halsey on the Miller crossroad by Carl Peterson, R.F.D. mail carrier out of Halsey, the following morning.

Stults and Harju, according to police, who investigated the case, were engaged in transporting scrap iron to Portland from Eugene. It is alleged that Stults and Harju became involved in an altercation over money matters prior to the alleged fight.

Assessor Providing Tax Roll Interest

Dallas—It will be matter of several weeks before the tax roll for 1940 will be far enough along to print an itemized summary, but we are far enough along with the writing levying bodies which can levy against property.

Of the 71 school districts in the county, 40 have levied a higher tax than last year. Many of the ones which did not levy a higher tax were affected by the rate in the non-high tax so will have more taxes anyhow. We also have a state tax this year for the first time in several years. Of the incorporated cities in the county some have levied considerable above anything they have ever had before and some have lowered their levies to some extent. Independence had a combined rate in 1939 of 64.0 mills; 1940, 62.7 mills; Monmouth, 1939, 84.3 mills; 1940, 64.0 mills; Falls City, 1939, 81.8 mills; 1940, 72.8 mills; Dallas, 1939, 65.7 mills; 1940, 68.5 mills; West Salem, 1939, 87.9 mills, and 1940, 105.6 mills.

The tax statements which will be mailed out in March will be much the same as last year except that we are putting a little more detail on them this year. Those having property which lies in more than one township will receive notices for the amount in each district or township as this is required of us. I presume the taxpayers are wondering how the new system is working as they are the ones who are paying for it. It has been inspected by numerous ones from the state offices and pronounced the best setup in the state and also there have been several delegations from different counties who have come to inspect it and all have pronounced it good.

We have made some changes in the system this year and there will be changes that can be worked out in the next two or three years which will improve it still more.

The state auditing department is recommending the study of it to other counties who are trying to improve their methods. It does require more equipment and entails much more work than the older methods, but it also gives a much more accurate check of county business than Polk county has ever had before.

When we realize that Polk county's business amounts to half a million dollars each year we can readily appreciate the need for modern methods of handling it.

Madame Mayor Will Announce Her Committees

Silverton—At the first council meeting of the year tonight Mayor Zetta Schlador will name her committees for the year with suggestions made by Mrs. Schlador that very little change in the personnel of her last year's committees will be made. The new budget, which received the final revisions Friday night, will be adopted.

It is to be noted that an increase of \$12,695 in taxes is included in the budget. The committee explained that the running expenses of the city are not responsible for the increase but that bonded indebtedness and sewer bonds voted some years ago are responsible for the jump. The past year's improvements fetch the increase up less than three mills, the committee explained. Another cause for the increase, it was reported, was the \$2000 cut in county road taxes.

The budget allows \$14,685 for running expenses. Of this amount, \$4660 is levied by direct vote. Total indebtedness for the city is \$165,399.74 with \$16,000 due in 1940. An additional item voted by the city council for the coming year was a \$60 increase in police salary to cover the cost of uniforms.

Indications are that the city manager's committee named by Mayor Schlador several weeks ago will not have a report ready for the council in making a decision for the councilmen as to whether the vote on city manager's committee as advised by the Silverton community planning council be placed before the people or not. It is thought the committee might make a final report by the first Monday in February when the council meets again.

Freeze Reported Hills Section

Silverton Hills—With dense fogs of the past few days giving way to a heavy frost shortly after midnight Saturday evening, this section is experiencing the first freeze of the season. This is considered of benefit as grain and fruit trees were making too definite a growth for this time of year. The freeze was not heavy enough to give any concern to the farmers.

The electricity will be turned on the first of the week on the extension to the Silverton Hills line. This addition to the main line includes the electrifying of four farms, the Henry DuVal home, the John Porter farm home leased to the Verrier family, two ranches owned by Oscar Lee, known as the Uphoff and Davenport places.
