The wood cuts, 20 in number, depicting landmarks and relics in and near Salem and are illustrative of the life in this area before 1870. The sketches were made from existing landmarks. Since Miss Fowler began her project two of the places have been torn down and several more are scheduled for oblivion. The primary interest in the collection from the historical standpoint lies in the fact that this vicinity was the first settled by Americans, the Methodist missionaries, who came in 1834 and opened the west for settlement.

Among historical landmarks in the collection are Jason Lee's home, Jason Lee family graves, Yamhill blockhouse, E. N. Cooke mansion, Condit church interior, St. Paul church, the Conner home, Jefferson, Waller hall, Willamette university campus and others.

The collection has been exhibited at the New York World's fair, the American print exhibition, Northwest Printmakers, Seattle; exhibition of drawings and prints, San Francisco Museum of Art, the Montalvo foundation in California, and at the Oregon state fair last September.
