## Vikings Play Bang-up Ball, All Get Hot

Just as aggressive as they were unimpressive a couple of days ago, Salem Vikings handed the Milwaukie Maroons a 59 to 17 drubbing last night. The No Name league game was played on the Milwaukie floor as a feature of the dedication ceremonies in connection with the new gymnasium. There never was any doubt concerning the outcome as Coach Hawk's boys bulged into an early lead and added to it as the game progressed. The win kept Salem's record clear insofar as No Name league games are concerned. However, the Vikings dropped one of the two-game series with Dallas.

Half-time score found the Vikings leading, 21-8, and at the three-quarter mark it was 37-10. Hawk swept the bench of players and during the final period the second string piled up 22 points. They, in turn, checked the Maroons so fiercely the latter had great difficulty in getting the ball across the mid-strip.

Coons, Kernes and Salstrom all played good ball for the winners. Next week the Vikings will take to the road, playing Eugene Tuesday and Medford Friday and Saturday. Tillamook will come here the night of the 23rd.

## Decisive Win Puts Beavers Out in Front

Eugene, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP)—Oregon State college held its first Eugene victory over the University of Oregon in four years today. The Beavers won last night, 35-31, before 6,500 wildly partisan spectators.

It was the third straight win for Oregon State and Oregon's first defeat. The victory was decisive for it was only by sporadic rallies that Coach Howard Hobson's crew of national champions could keep within shooting distance of the enemy.

The Webfoet took an early lead, but Oregon State pulled ahead at the eight minute mark and stayed there. The Beavers at one time held a 21-6 advantage, but the Webfoet rallied to make the half-time count 23-14.

The game was bitterly contested throughout, with frequent pileups and scrimmages under the baskets. Three players—Romano and Hunter of Oregon State and Borchert of Oregon—were banished on fouls.

Vic Townsend, Oregon guard, led the scorers with 14. Center John Mandie was high for the Beavers with 10.

## Barrows Is Author Of 'Pedigree' Book
