

Rural Electrification Program Given Silverton

Farmers Learn Through Talks, Movie Pictures

Silverton—Harry L. Richey, Marion county agent, is host to the farmers of the Silverton district in a two-day rural electrification educational program under the direction of the extension service of the Oregon State college, at the army with a well represented group attending. Featured are movies, talks and demonstrations.

Appearing in addresses and leading discussions Thursday forenoon in electric wiring, lighting and farm refrigeration topics were W. R. Volney, chief electrical inspector of the bureau of labor; Joan Patterson, home furnishing specialist of Oregon State college; and Everett H. Davis, Oregon State extension agricultural engineer.

Thursday afternoon was given over to the discussion of the use of electricity on the poultry farm in brooding, floor heating, house lighting, ventilation, water heating, egg room humidifiers and fly electrocutors. Jerry Mason, service supervisor of Portland General Electric company, gave a talk on poultry water heating equipment; Mr. Davis appeared, also P. E. Price, agricultural engineer of the Oregon State college and Ivan Branton, assistant agricultural engineer of Oregon State.

Davis appears on today's afternoon program in talks on walnut, filbert and corn drying and the use of electricity for pig brooders and liquid manure pumps. Mr. Branton is to discuss feed grinding and mixing, and C. L. Moore, P.E.G. agricultural engineer, told of filling silos, water heating and sterilizing on the dairy farm.

Today's forenoon program was given over to the subject of irrigation with demonstration by a collection of pictures taken and compiled by Charles Davis of Silverton who installed many pumps for irrigation in the Silverton communities during the past season. County Agent Richey discussed irrigation in various parts of Marion county. Willamette valley farms irrigated were shown in the series of movies through the courtesy of the P.E.G. company; Arthur King, extension specialist in soils, Oregon State, advised the group on the selection of irrigation systems, and L. C. Moore told of utilizing electric power for irrigation.

The program is the initial one of its kind in this section and is proving of interest as a number of the farm homes have recently been electrified.

Dog Licenses Give Surplus After Claims

Albany—Linn county paid out \$110 from the dog fund in 1939. It was announced by R. M. Russell, county clerk, Thursday. After claims totaling \$110.50 had been allowed a \$1,556.14 balance remained in the dog fund. There now remains \$1000 as a "nest egg" for this year. The dog fund is replenished by \$1 and \$2 license fees collected annually by the county.

Acting under command of a state law, the court transferred to the general fund \$656.15 from the dog fund, source of money with which sheep, turkey and goat claims are paid. The order explains that the law requires any balance in the dog fund in excess of \$1000 to be transferred to the general fund.

The court this year for the first time paid turkey claims. Only two claimants filed reports of turkeys killed by dogs, one claiming the loss of 85 birds and the other 12, totaling 97 turkeys.

This year's allowance was a record low for all claims. Sheep owners received \$1664.50, inasmuch as the perpetrator of one killing was detected and the dog's owner paid \$4.

The total of claims allowed by the court last year was \$1399.75, which is \$289.25 more than the total of allowance this year, members of the county court, who allow claims, stated.
