Monmouth Council Signs Power Contract

Monmouth—Authorization of the purchase of \$40,000 in electric light and power bonds authorized by the charter amendment of November 8, 1938, was passed by the Monmouth council at a special session this week.

The charter authorized the sale of \$55,000 in bonds, \$40,000 to be sold at this time. Bonds are to be in denominations of \$500 each, to mature at annual intervals and not to cost more than 4 1/2 per cent interest. Bids will be opened February 6. The city at present contemplates installation of a new system. Mayor Bow-en states that the power company franchise has still nine years to run. The franchise was passed in 1899 and was for 50 years, but the courts have ruled such franchises cannot lawfully run more than 25 years.

A statement at the council meeting reveals the city is in excellent financial condition, the public debt, payable through taxes, having been reduced \$23,900. Of this amount \$5,000 is city hall bonds and \$17,900 is sewer bonds. Back taxes to the amount of \$1,600 received by the city last year helped to all the streets and will be used to build a pumper tank for use in small fires.
