Linn Public Welfare Costs Still Mount

Albany—While general assistance cash obligations of the Linn County Public Welfare agency last year were \$9,022.85 less than in 1938, the total of expenditures for all forms of assistance administered by the welfare committee increased \$11,430.99 during the year to a total of \$185,355.81, of state, county and federal funds, according to the report of John Beard, county welfare administrator.

The county's share of such assistance was \$48,872.89, in addition to the \$900 appropriated from the county treasury for the soldiers' indigent fund, and \$6,145 budgeted for the county farm, making a grand total of \$55,917 expended by the county for relief purposes.

The reports of the welfare administrator showed that during last year \$36,562.86 was obligated for general cash assistance, \$119,289.25 for old age assistance, \$24,226 for aid to dependent children and \$3,257.50 in assistance to the blind.

Comparison with 1938 totals revealed that an increase of \$14,704.25 was allowed in old age assistance during the year.

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Tax Returns Almost Equal Roll Listing

Albany — Tax collections in Linn county during the last year lacked but \$7,297.10 of equalling the total amount on the roll for all purposes. It was revealed Saturday by the semi-annual report of Amy Ross, a deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections, under supervision of Sheriff Herbert Shelton.

The report shows a grand total of \$887,393.50 turned over to the treasurer by the sheriff. The total amount on the rolls was \$894,690.60.

Collected on the 1939 roll was \$744,342.65, while delinquent tax collections totaled \$138,854.81.

Delinquent taxes collected in 1938 totaled \$82,351.24 while only \$1,947.87 was collected in 1939. Collections of delinquent taxes steadily climbed from that year.
