Scroggin Will Head Board Forum Members

Lebanon—Plans for the annual turkey day, when Lebanon is host to all turkey growers who market their birds through Linn county, progressed this week with appointment of Ralph Scroggin as chairman of general arrangements.

Scroggin was appointed by L. E. Arnold, chairman of the agricultural committee for the Lebanon Commercial club, which sponsors and underwrites the event. Scroggin named County Agent Floyd Mullen program chairman, Arnold solicitation chairman, and Glenn Gillenwater, J. H. Irvine and R. M. Hayden in assistant capacities.

The committee decided to broadcast again the banquet program over KOAC, explaining the moderate cost is well worth the publicity afforded.

Meetings will be held in morning and afternoon with Oregon State college specialists and representatives from the industry on the speaking list. No charge will be made growers for either the meetings or the banquet.

Future Farmer Annual Banquet Held, Woodburn

Woodburn—The annual banquet of the Woodburn chapter of the Future Farmers of America was held at the high school in the Home Economics banquet room Wednesday evening.

The opening ceremony of the FFA was given with Vice President Coleman presiding and the invocation was given by Rev. Oluf Asper. Carl Schultz, toastmaster for the evening, welcomed the parents and other guests, and John Coleman responded in behalf of the parents.

Bond Interest Will Be Met

Turner—The city council held a special meeting this week with the city attorney, George Duncan, attending. Seventy-one per cent of the 1940 budget has been apportioned to a fund for the redemption of the refunding bond issue.

The budget committee, with J. S. McKinney as chairman, provided this amount by voting the levy of a special tax for 1940. All interest on the bonds is included in this tax. The general tax, which this year is levied to the full of its legal limitation, is free to be used as the council decides, with 11 cents going to the road and street fund.

In the past this general tax has taken care of all regular expenses plus all bond interest, which amounted to \$600 per annum from 1914 until 1938, when three bonds were purchased. A balance of \$705 was left on hand at the end of the year. In 1939, \$510 interest was paid from the general tax, leaving on hand a balance of \$745 at the end of the year.

A bill presented for the attorney's fee was voted paid. A second bill presented by E. S. Prather for the city treasurer and city recorder's bonds were rejected, as the records show this amount had been paid when the bonds were issued.

Legion Plaque Requirements Given Pupils

Mt. Angel—Representing the Mt. Angel post of the American Legion, Dr. E. J. Corcoran addressed the eighth grade pupils of St. Mary's school on the purpose and conditions of the honor awards which the local Legion post is offering to the best scoring boy or girl.

Judging will be done at the end of the school term and the presentation will be made at the commencement exercises.

The purpose of the American Legion in offering these awards to the children is to help cultivate ideals in the youth coming to citizenship. By holding before the boy and girl at the impressionable age of adolescence the importance of honor, courage and unselfishness, and urging them to strive to attain these qualities, it is hoped that a great step will be taken to perpetuate the ideal American in our country.
