Oregon Society, S.A.R., Holds Banquet

Large and interesting affair of Saturday night was the banquet held at the Hotel Argo by the Oregon Society, Sons of the American Revolution. Governor Charles A. Sprague, a member of the organization, and Claude Ingalls, editor of the Corvallis Gazette Times, shared program honors. Quincy Scott of Portland presided. Karl Pease of Salem was chairman on arrangements.

Mr. Ingalls, in his speech of the evening, pointed out that the fundamental principals of government are as valid now as they were when written by the founding fathers. He traced the English constitutional history from its origin in the time of the Magna Charta to the judicial decisions of the 18th century.

The American constitution came from realizing that George III's politicians could and had been overthrown but that new ones could assume their places. They drew up the constitution with certain rules which would keep the politicians in bounds and then they designed the supreme court to act as umpire.

Governor Sprague spoke informally on Abraham Lincoln and traced his lineage to a captain in the revolutionary forces. He told early experiences of Lincoln while he was serving as an attorney and political figure in Illinois.
