Three Degrees To be Offered; Sublimity Host

Sublimity—A caravan is being formed at Stayton and Sublimity to motor to St. Paul Sunday, February 4, to witness the exemplification of the three degrees of the Knights of Columbus on a class of over 20 candidates for the St. Paul council. Candidates will also be added to this class from Mt. Angel and other valley towns. The degree work will be under the direction of State Deputy Edward J. Bell and District Deputy C. A. Suling. Mt. Angel council degree team will have charge of the first and second degrees.

Following the degrees at 6:30 o'clock a banquet is being served by the women of the St. Paul parish at the Community hall to which the general public is invited. Newly Born Infant Saved by Resuscitator

Woodburn—Woodburn's new resuscitator, which was presented to the city just a week ago, proved its value to the community Tuesday afternoon when it saved the life of a new born baby at the Anna hospital at 8:30 o'clock.

The baby, a boy, and the first child of Mr. and Mrs. John Doubrava of Hubbard, was unable to breathe or cry at birth. Dr. Gerald Smith, who was in attendance, immediately called for the resuscitator and in five minutes time it was at the hospital. It was operated by Ralph Nibler of the fire department and Dr. Willard Chandler for one hour and 45 minutes when the baby began to breathe normally and is now in a satisfactory condition.

This was the second call for the resuscitator in 24 hours, the first being for a boy at the state training school Monday who had committed suicide by taking poison. The boy was too far gone when discovered for the machine to be of any help.

The machine was purchased by the Junior Women's club, which started a campaign to raise funds for this purpose about two months ago and every club and other organization in the city and many from the surrounding communities have donated money for this purpose. Final payment for the machine will be made in two weeks and contributions for the fund are still being received by the club.
