

Kitchen and Lunchroom Project Completed at Silverton

Public Invited To Look Over School Layout

Silverton—One of the biggest undertakings ever accomplished by the Parent-Teacher association is the lunchroom and kitchen project for the pupils of the grades and junior high department as the result of the work and cooperation of the association, the board of directors, public-minded citizens who are donating labor and material, and a firm determination on the part of the president of the P.T.A., Mrs. J. J. Lewis.

Tomorrow afternoon the large rooms will be opened for the inspection of the Silverton public. Each guest has the privilege of bringing as a donation a few potatoes, carrots, onions or soup bone or cheap cut of meat in order to get the serving of lunches started without expense to the children Monday of next week.

After the serving is well underway, the plans are for a few pennies in charge for the one hot dish for children who bring their lunches, or on rainy days for those who find it convenient to remain at school during the noon hour. The cooks are supplied through a WPA plan. Dishes have been bought and silver ware donated and purchased for the serving of around 200 at one time.

The two large rooms, formerly the school library location, have been converted into a modern, up-to-the-minute kitchen, serving table and long tables and benches for the children to use while eating their lunch.

In a plan to serve the one hot dish without cost to the pupil, a number of entertainments are planned with the community jamboree, a pageant with numbers from organizations of town, the next on the list. Donations are welcomed at all times and will be cared for by phoning any member of the executive committee of which Mrs. Lewis is chairman and Mrs. J. W. Jordan, associate chairman.

This move has been felt as a need for many years in the Silverton schools and has been previously undertaken but on account of the lack of room, has never materialized.

Lebanon—Another step toward establishment of a city park adjoining the Santiam river was taken by the city council Tuesday night when it approved a memorandum of agreement with the Mountain States Power company, owner of the 20-acre property.

The council authorized the mayor and recorder to sign the memorandum and a warrant in favor of the utility for \$2000, the purchase price. The papers will be placed in escrow until the utility concludes reorganization proceedings and the title to the property is clear. Actual transfer is expected in the very near future. It is reported.

Plans are now being made for improving the property, and when transfer is made, the city will make immediate application for a WPA park project, it was reported.

Council Accepts Water Contracts On Two Projects

Scio—Resolutions of acceptance of completion of contracts two and three under the waterworks project initiated at Scio 18 months ago were adopted at the February meeting of the city council. These have been forwarded to PWA at San Francisco for consideration.

R. H. Corey of Portland, consulting engineer for the city in the project who succeeded G. T. Ellison of Salem, had certified to completion and had recommended acceptance. It is believed the matter soon will be closed by the PWA, which has supplied 45 per cent of the cost of the project.

Early in the proceedings Councilman Bryan was appointed by the council to represent the city in its relations with the PWA in the waterworks improvement project, in which the city at a special election early in the autumn of 1938, authorized issuance of bonds to assist in financing the improvement program.

Two wells have been drilled in efforts to secure adequate water supply for the city for many years to come. The first well, reaching a depth of 350 in South Scio, was virtually a failure at a cost of two or three thousand dollars.

Second well, 207 feet deep, was completed a short time ago in northwest Scio, and it is believed by those in charge that ample supply of water of good quality now is available in the city.

Deep well pump, pump house, ditch and main have been installed and soon will be in full operation, according to announced plans at the late council meeting.
