

Stadium Nearly Completed at Monmouth Fair Grounds

Forum Workers Are Selected; Reports Given

Monmouth—C. C. Powell, president of the Monmouth Chamber of Commerce, has named his committee as follows:

Fair, H. W. Morlan, three years; L. B. Howard, two years; Oscar Groves, one year; road, Phillip Schweizer, Ira C. Powell and Charles Calbreath; entertainment, P. E. Chambers, Fred J. Hill, Tony Moraver; better business, C. F. Gillette. H. W. Hogmeier was chosen secretary. He succeeds Robert Price, who submitted his resignation after serving two years.

A report by the fair committee reveals that work on the stadium is about complete; the stock barn is in process of erection and the material is on the ground for the seven-foot fence which will enclose the grounds to be used for athletics. The cost of material totaling about \$2500 is less than the first estimate.

A newly inaugurated road project, reported by C. C. Powell, proposes the improvement and straightening of the road from Salem to Independence on the Marion county side of the Willamette, with a bridge across the river and continuing on through Monmouth and Kings Valley for a cut-off road to Newport.

In compliance with a request by the Chamber, County Agent A. C. Leth proposes to sponsor an electrical appliance education meeting in the Monmouth school gymnasium in the near future, with the aid of instructors from Oregon State college.

That Polk is the most diversified product county in the United States, according to Leth, and its various seasonal crops and products might make advisable the holding of various exhibit shows throughout the year.

The lamb show committee, Claude Winesgar, C. W. Price, J. H. Cody, and F. Woodward is considering the possibility of adding wool products to the coming lamb show.

The Chamber voted \$10 to the proposed forum for the city. Dr. Donald Searing reported for the planning board, and as a result, the Chamber resolved to put its influence in favor of having the board consider all proposals which called for contributions from the general public. The board formerly had aimed to make no recommendations for projects under \$50. Dr. Searing and Mr. Groves were continued as representatives on the board.
