

Stayton Starts City Street Improvement Program

Citizens Ask Council Place Plan on Ballot

Stayton—The possibility of improvement to many of the streets in Stayton by placing a plan on the ballot at the meeting of the council, when a citizens committee presented a petition asking for such a program. A preliminary survey indicated that the most fair and popular method of financing would be through a general bond issue, rather than by the Baneroff method of property assessments. If the property owners generally ask it, the matter will be decided by vote at the coming primary election.

The likelihood of one or more new subdivisions in the town raised the matter of providing for uniformity of streets, and the matter was referred to the street and ordinance committees for investigation. A proposal to fix license fees for dealers in fruits and vegetables was discussed and referred to a committee.

Mr. Nelson of Salem, representing the National Youth administration, outlined the work done among unemployed youth in the various communities. Under that program the sponsor is required to furnish a supervisor and any materials required. Because of the lateness of the season, and the fact that more work in private employment will be available, no definite action was taken on the proposal.

Lee Ross of Salem, auditor employed by the council, made a report on his audit, which showed the accounts of the town to be in excellent condition. Ross recommended some changes in the method of bookkeeping to more clearly show the receipts and disbursements in the various funds, and also recommended that a survey and appraisal be made of all properties owned by the town, and the same set up on a basis for depreciation so as to better inform the budget committee of future requirements each year. Ross also recommended a method of regulations covering purchases by the town. The report on the lien docket was not complete and will be made at a future meeting.

Progress Made In Club Work

St. Mary's—Four-H club work is gathering new impetus in St. Mary's. As three men of the community have agreed to take over the leadership of four new clubs organized this week. Although St. Mary's school has already had a very large club enrollment the leaders were always taken from the teaching staff.

At a recent achievement program here, H. C. Seymour and Wayne D. Harding, as well as Father Alcun, urged more interest and active cooperation on the part of the parents. As a result, Andrew Schmidt has agreed to take over a club of six members. Ed Hammer will lead both a corn and pig club, five boys being enrolled in the former and six in the latter. Thirteen clubs have been active since last fall when they were organized. The new clubs bring up the total for the school to 18.

Beal Resigns Hubbard Post

Hubbard—Superintendent Pat Beal of the Hubbard schools, who was recently re-elected for his fourth year, tendered his resignation to the school board Tuesday night to take effect at the end of the present school year.

Beal has accepted a position as superintendent of the high and grade schools and athletic coach at Jefferson, succeeding Elmo Jensen. Since he came to Hubbard in 1937 the enrollment of the high school has increased from 52 to 111. During his first year he installed football and during the three year period Hubbard has played 28 games, winning 16, losing eight and tying four, a percentage of .666. A new gymnasium has been built with many improvements over the old one which was destroyed by fire; a fourth teacher has been added to the faculty; track and tennis have been installed and several new organizations established including the Quill and Scroll, Boosters club, Red Cross, and high school orchestra; a PWA librarian has been engaged; a printed high school yearbook put out and also a high school annual.

Beal graduated from the St. Helena high school and in 1931 graduated from the University of Oregon. He taught two years at Scio, two years at Stayton and two years at Canby and is now completing his third year at Hubbard. His successor has not been chosen.

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Four Groups Take Part in Contest

Hubbard—Amateur night, sponsored by the Variety "H" of Hubbard high school, will be held in the gymnasium Friday evening. There will be four groups of contestants, including children of pre-school age, grade school pupils, high school pupils and adults.

A worth while prize will be given to the best amateur in each group and a grand prize to the best amateur on the program. Children, students and adults with talent are invited to enter. Entrants may register in the high school office if they wish to participate in the program and will be restricted to one number only. Judges who will make the final decision will be seated among the spectators. The proceeds are to be used for baseball activities.

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Charter Change For Officials Given Sanction

Lebanon—A resolution was passed by the city council Tuesday night, placing before the Lebanon electorate on the primary ballot a charter amendment proposing that minor officers of the city be appointed by the council rather than electing the city at large as is the present case.

The officers involved are city attorney, engineer, night and day marshal, health officer and street superintendent.

The proposed change does not affect method of filling the offices of mayor, recorder, treasurer or the six councilmen. The system of choosing all officers by general election has been practiced since May in 1932. An effort to amend the charter as now proposed was made two years ago but the move was abandoned when it was found the petitions were erroneous in form, although they bore more than the necessary number of signatures.

Another major action of the meeting was to agree to sponsor a National Youth administration program for improving parking strips. The council took this step and also guaranteed to pay costs in excess of the estimates for the first thousand feet of improvement after Dr. H. J. Whelan, chairman of the park and beautification committee, stated that the project was set to get under way Monday.

Dr. Whelan said costs would run to 10¢ per square foot or 7¢ per linear foot on the average lot. Twelve boys have signed up for labor, and a supervisor has been hired. Application blanks are now available for property owners at the city hall. After the first thousand feet is improved, adjustments may be made in the rates.

The council agreed to start paving of streets once they are free of water following reading of a letter from WPA stating the administration does not approve continuance of walk, curb and gutter construction longer than practical. City Engineer Stanley Stewart was instructed to make preparations for an application for a new project so that walk construction may be renewed at a later date, and more streets be paved if there is demand.
