

Linn County Sheriff Race Promises to be Scorching

Both Parties Are Expected To Enter More

Albany—The hottest political race to develop thus far in the May primaries in Linn county will be that for the nomination for sheriff in both democratic and republican parties.

Two candidates for the office of sheriff made their intentions official Tuesday when Mike Southard, democrat, filed his petition, as did E. C. McClain, republican.

Southard, a former deputy under Herbert Shelton, will attempt to defeat his former employer for the nomination and also Jess Moss, who recently filed his petition.

E. C. McClain so far is the only republican aspirant for the office of sheriff, but other candidates have expressed their intention to file on that ticket, it was announced.

County Treasurer Grover C. Vance has filed his candidacy for nomination on the democratic ticket looking toward re-election.

Orators Will Compete

Albany—Linn county will be represented at a division constitution oratorical contest Saturday, March 23, under auspices of the Oregon department of the American Legion, by Richard Owen, Lebanon high school student, who won the county contest at the Veterans' Memorial hall Monday. Owen was one of three contestants, of whom the other two, E. L. Coates, Albany, and Burton Blackwell, Lebanon, were adjudged tied for second place. The winning orator dealt with the subject, "The Constitution and Unity."

In addition to giving a prepared oration, each contestant gave a brief extemporaneous talk, also upon some phase of the constitution, each subject being designated by lot at the time of the contest. The winner of the division contest, to be held at Salem, will vie in state finals at Portland, March 30.
