

\$100,000 Lost In Mountains Says Scotty

Death Valley, Calif., March 13 (AP)—There's \$100,000 in gold certificates buried in the mountains, Death Valley Scotty has told the federal government.

A visit of a couple of U. S. internal revenue officers to the castle a few weeks ago set the old mystery prospector to thinking. He had satisfied the income tax investigators, who had been on his trail for years, with a signed statement in January that he had no income for 30 years or so, and had been getting all of his funds on loans from his partner, A. M. Johnson.

"I got to thinking about my yellowbacks that I planted more'n 20 years before Uncle Sam started digging his hole to bury gold in down at Fort Knox, Kentucky," said Scotty. "So I just sat down and wrote a letter to the old gentleman with the beard."

Here is the letter:

"United States Collector of Internal Revenue:

"I had a bunch of money amounting to one hundred thousand dollars in gold certificates and I buried it in the mountains about the year nineteen hundred and nine. Afterwards cloudbursts came and covered it up and maybe some time I will be able to get it and maybe I will never get it."

There were 10 yellowbacks of \$10,000 each, says Scotty.

War Veterans Take Stand on Alien Issue

Practically unanimous adoption of a resolution placing members on record as being opposed to "the employment of individuals who are not citizens of the United States of America in service for the various government agencies, whether such agencies be federal, state or municipal," receiving reports upon the progress of the new Veterans' building, preparation for the observance of Buddy Poppy day set for May 25, and the initiation of a group of new recruits marked the high lights of the meeting of Marion post, 661, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, at Eagles hall.

The resolution concerning the employment of aliens in government work, federal, state, county and municipal, applies to aliens who have resided in the country for years and have not applied for citizenship as provided by law and who are enjoying steady employment at the expense of the taxpayer and to the detriment of American citizens who are unable to secure work for the support of themselves and dependents. Copies of the resolution are to be presented to governing bodies of the state of Oregon, county of Marion and city of Salem.
