Library Lists Garden Books

National Garden week, April 1-6, has been set aside by garden clubs all over the country to focus attention on the advent of the growing season. The Salem public library is cooperating by calling attention to its collection of more than 125 books on all phases of gardening.

These books range in subject from the culture of plants, flowers, shrubs and vegetables, the care as well as planting of lawns and the landscaping of home grounds. The library's collection on flower growing and garden planning is especially valuable and in great demand at this time of year.

There have always been good women gardeners, but of recent times more and more men have been taking up gardening as a leisure time activity. Men are good gardeners after they learn how to tell a sprouting flower from a weed, and in many Salem homes the men are the most enthusiastic and hard working members of the gardening family.

Most of Salem's amateur gardeners have learned the value of consulting recognized garden authorities as found in books. It adds to the pleasure of growing flowers and plants to be able to use the correct botanical names. Also, the best and easiest method for performing every job in the garden, as explained in garden books, adds to pleasure of growing things.

For the beginners there are general gardening manuals and encyclopedias. For the specialist there are such books as "Rhododendrons and Azaleas" by Bowers; "Bulb Gardening" by Hampden; "Aquarian and Garden Pools" by Cotton; "Rock Garden Plants" by Elliot. These and many others which are available at the public library will help the amateur gardener to expert knowledge which will result in more beautiful gardens.
