

City Managership Keeps Silverton Politics Alive

Council Report Release Due Next Few Days

Silverton—Things are warming up in Silverton with the whole town awaiting the report of the city council committee of investigation on the city managership form of government, which will be given out within a few days. This information was learned late Friday from Mayor Zetta Schlador, and the chairman of the council committee, Norris Ames.

The political situation for the city vote in the May primaries is a sort of "to be or not to be" scrap in that some are arguing for city manager form of government and some for the present set up, at least in the present vote.

A. W. Green, incumbent, and L. M. Larson, former councilman, have filed for places on the board of aldermen for the city council in opposition to those sponsored by the planning council, Ernest L. Starr, John W. Jordan and Reber Allen. The "no's" have not put up a candidate for mayor but the planning council is favoring Lowell E. Brown in the May primary vote.

Opponents to city manager form at present have presented figures revealing a clean slate as to indebtedness by 1940-47 under the present regime, and state the fact that they are fearful of any increase of costs if the change is voted as early as this year.

A few weeks ago some friction was evidenced when the planning council urged the city council to place the vote of the city manager or not before the people in the May primaries. The city council demurred and the planning council resorted to the initiative in order to place the question on the ballot. The city council gave as the reason for delaying action the awaiting the report of the council committee of investigation which had been named in December by the mayor with the approval of the aldermen, who were to make personal visits to other towns.

The report of this committee is promised within the next few days by Norris Ames, chairman.

This report has to do with the findings of the committee members to these towns, six in all, where they made individual inquiries by means of curbstones, quia methods of citizens as well as gaining official book facts and figures as to conditions in these towns operating under whatever form of government they are sponsoring. The report will be submitted in writing to the citizens of Silverton for consideration.

Other members of the city council committee besides Ames are Frank Way, Hugh B. Latham, Reber Allen, L. M. Larson, W. R. Tomlinson and E. W. Garver.

The planning council, only advisory, was organized around two years ago in a meeting of the Lutheran Brotherhood at the home of Attorney and Mrs. Alf. O. Nelson on the basis of a "National Youth Improvement" plan. After favoring a civic center (not yet materialized) the public swimming pool and construction of a new high school, the demands of the group went into the weightier matters of city government, out of which has developed the present controversy.

The planning council, through Dr. P. A. Loar, president, has announced meetings April 16 and May 7. Also a mass meeting is planned just previous to the May primaries to discuss last-minute questions on voting.

Lifelong Woodburn Man Drops Dead
