Water Board High Level Study Is Authorized

The Salem water commission last night authorized a study to be made concerning necessity for greater high level storage capacity for the water system, that is a supply for areas in the city that are too high for the pressure from the 10,000,000 gallon reservoir on Fairmount hill.

The present high level service is from the elevated tank near the reservoir. There is a possibility that this might be replaced by an underground reservoir.

The commission employed Percy A. Cupper, consulting engineer, to work with Manager Carl Guenther in making the survey, and Cupper said the work probably would start the coming week.

Extension of a two-inch line of pipe for 2600 feet to serve South 22nd street, south of Turner road, was authorized on advice of the Marion county health department. At present shallow wells are the only water service in the district.

Manager Guenther was instructed to confer with the fire department committee of the city council relative to extending a six-inch main 450 feet south on 25th to give fire protection to George E. Waters' baseball field.

The commission accepted a bid from Knight L. Peary for landscaping the ground around the reservoir.

A report by Manager Guenther showed that water usage in March, this year, was an increase of 17,431,575 over March of last year and that active accounts have increased by 190. Residential and industrial usage last month totaled 110,240,925 as against 92,809,350 in March of 1939. The Oregon Pulp & Paper company used 55,110,525 against 44,182,050 a year ago.
