Skits and Scratches

Wind and a warm sun have worked wonders for the field out at George E. Waters ball park. A week ago, a lot of fans, myself included, were a bit dubious as to whether a good game of ball would be played on the diamond this summer. Filling in of some of the low spots, clipping the grass and otherwise manhandling the park have made a remarkable transformation. Just how much of a shower the field will stand before a postponement of a ball game is necessary, remains to be seen. However, time is in favor of Biddy Bishop, who is here, there and everywhere as he keeps the machinery moving. The longer the period without rain, the greater the opportunity for the water table to lower a bit. After all, it's more than two weeks before the season opens here.

The American Legion, the pioneering organization in the matter of junior baseball, is branching out in its athletic field of endeavor. The latest venture takes the form of "Junior Olympics" with the grand finale taking place at the University of Oregon, May 3 and 4. Here in Salem, as is to be expected, Oliver Huston is at the helm. A lot of details remain to be clarified, but this much is certain: All kids between the ages of 14 and 17, inclusive, will be welcome to participate in the Salem trials, slated for Friday, April 26, at 4 p.m. on Olinger field and at the YMCA, April 27 at 2 p.m. Those participating must bring evidence of the date of their birth.

Wisconsin really has a program of reforestation. The state was one of the first to be denuded and knows from bitter experience the results of ruthlessly mowing down the trees. It has four forest-tree nurseries which supplied 30,847,837 young trees for planting last year. The planting of 21,000,000 of these trees added 17,727 acres to Wisconsin's forest plantations. Specimens raised include Norway pine, jack pine, white pine, white spruce, Scotch pine, Norway spruce, black locust, Austrian pine, flowering pear tree, Chinese elm, red oak, white ash. Plantings were made in every one of the state's 71 counties.

Fishing in Wisconsin hasn't been neglected and as a consequence it has reached the "big business class." It is estimated that licensed fishermen spend forty million dollars yearly for their sport in the state. Enthusiasts for lake trout trolling spend \$75,000 annually fishing among the Apostle Islands in Lake Superior. The state planted 139,000 fish back in 1937, indicating they early realized that artificial methods must be used to replenish the streams. Last year the total was 1,133,472,848. (Quite a job of counting, to say nothing of the propagation.)

Manager "Bunny" Griffiths, directing the Senators at Corvallis this afternoon, may use a number of men against Twin Falls, since he plans to cut his squad to some extent following the contest. He released 10 yesterday and plans to be down to the 15 man limit well in advance of the opening date for league play, April 23.

Griffiths planned to play a couple of men for each position at Corvallis this afternoon and will doubtless follow a similar plan tomorrow. He is keeping himself out of the line-up in order to give as many men as possible a chance to show their wares.

Salem Trials Scheduled for April 26-27

A program of "Junior Olympics" is being sponsored by the American Legion this spring and through cooperation with the athletic department of the University of Oregon, the state championships will be held on Hayward field May 3 and 4. Capitol post will conduct Salem city competition on Olinger field at 4 o'clock the afternoon of April 26 and at the YMCA at 2 o'clock April 27.
