Music Week Programs Calendared for May

National Music week will be observed in Salem in early May with many interesting programs. The theme, "Support Group Activities," will be carried out with versatile programs planned by the Music week directorate to encourage participation in music by organized groups. On May 9 a program will be given at Waller hall on the Willamette university campus by Salem's leading musical organizations with a fine array of talent assembled. Various groups of musicians will lend their services to the people of Salem that night in honor of music week.

Programs are also being planned by musicians for the pleasure of inmates in the state institutions. The Calvary Baptist church choir, under the direction of E. D. Lindberg, will give a program at the state hospital. The Junior Woman's club, with Miss Hazel Shutt as chairman, will present programs at the penitentiary, tuberculosis hospital and girls' training school.

The public schools will present "Hansel and Gretel," under the direction of Miss Gretchen Kremer. The school for the blind and Sacred Heart academy will give attractive programs during the week.

The above programs, scheduled for music week, are only a small part of what Music week will bring to Salem from May 5-11.

Igor Gorin Composer As Well as Performer

In Igor Gorin, outstanding alike as composer and performer, may be found a blend of creative and interpretive artistry all too rare in the annals of music and the handsome young baritone, who appears in concert at the Salem high school Wednesday, April 17, under the sponsorship of the community concert association, believes his song writing is exerting an important influence on his singing and vice versa.

Two of Gorin's compositions, "Lament" and "Caucasian Song," published by Schirmer last year, have already enjoyed great success and, despite heavy singing commitments, Gorin has been able to prepare two additional songs, "Lullaby" and "Safe By de Lawd," for release shortly. The latter, a negro spiritual, is of particular interest as a reaction to this Russian-born artist to a camp meeting he witnessed near Hollywood while out there at work on his first motion picture, "Broadway Melody of 1936." He was amazed to find, Gorin declares, a great similarity between the American negro music to which he was introduced on that occasion and the Slavic music on which he was reared. "The

Most of Gorin's compositions to date have been an expression of situations and problems he, himself, has known and they shed an interesting light on the young artist's background. "Caucasian Melody," which he includes on his concert program, is an expansion of a strain, that has stayed with him since his early childhood in Ukraine, when a group of Caucasian workmen came to the little town in which he was born to build a channel. Gorin remembers watching them work and hearing them sing and it was part of one of the songs these men sang at their work that inspired his "Caucasian Melody," a song that recaptures musically the simple joys of life among the shepherds in the Caucasian mountains. His "Lullaby" (Lament), of more recent inspiration, relates melodically the plight of a young man struggling to find a place for himself in the life of a vast metropolis, and Gorin is not afraid to admit that his own struggles to establish himself when he arrived in this country supplied some of the background of the song. The conclusion of "Lullaby" offers the thought that while, in moments of despondency, one is often tempted to question the wisdom of Providence, ultimately one's faith in Divine power must be rewarded.
