

Silverton to Vote Upon City Manager Government

Primary Ballot Gets Measure After Reports

Silverton—The Silverton city council accepted both the majority and minority reports of the investigating committee on the "to be or not to be" city manager opinions following several months of comparative study of various towns, at a specially called meeting by Mayor Zetta Schloder Tuesday afternoon at the office of City Recorder Geo. W. Hubbs.

The minority report was signed by H. B. Latham, E. W. Garver and L. M. Larson. Their report concluded: "We the undersigned members of your committee concur with the majority report, excepting the paragraph pertaining to fixed payroll costs per capita."

"While we think the figures shown were carefully compiled, we consider that the different situations in the cities mentioned vary so much that the tabulations are useless for the purpose of comparison."

The paragraph to which the minority referred had to do with the following:

This was signed by Norris Ames, Frank Wray, Reber Allen and W. R. Tomlinson.

The above towns run by a city-manager form of government are Oregon City and Hillsboro, Cottage Grove empowers its mayor as purchasing agent and acting manager. Dallas and Silverton are under the mayor-city council form of government.

The previously submitted report, to which objection was voiced by two members of the committee, gave the per capita cost, but did not specify the "fixed" salary. The minority group of the committee contended that no salary of Silverton is fixed. That the amount required to run the city depends on the amount of improvements as the need arises. That the only fair way of submitting figures in the way of city running expenses is to take an average of budget demands for a period of many years. The question concerning the water department under a separate head from the city management was voiced and the following report submitted for Silverton as compared to the other towns:

The vote for or against a change from the present form of city government will be placed on the May ballot for Silverton. This was done by initiative procedure as the investigating committee was delayed in making its advisory report in time for the council's decision.

The Silverton planning council, an outgrowth of a meeting around two years ago, at the home of Al O. Nelson, when the Lutheran Brotherhood agreed to sponsor civic improvement, especially pertaining to youth betterment, has favored the change to city manager, and under the presidency of Dr. Loar has negotiated many lectures and informational meetings concerning the plan of city manager.

Log Operators Seek Increase Truck Permits

Albany—Logging workers and members of the Albany Chamber of Commerce and Lebanon Commercial club, numbering 25, called upon the Lincoln county court Tuesday, requesting an increase in the number of log truck permits issued for the Millersburg crossing to the Groshong landing on the Willamette river. Archie Heseman, of the McDowell Creek Logging company, Sweet Home, acted as spokesman.

Mr. Heseman represented that his concern and the Crescent Logging company, which is also interested, employ 160 men, operate from 35 to 40 trucks and have a payroll of \$565 a day which will be impaired if the number of permits is not increased.

The court revealed it had agreed to issue 22 permits, allowing about 18 trucks a day to use the road, until such time as it could be ascertained how well the roadbed will withstand the heavy traffic.

It was also made known that a contract had been drawn up Saturday by the district attorney, pledging the truck operating agencies to maintain this road and the Brickyard and Airport roads sufficiently to keep them readily available to other traffic. In the contract the operators agreed to put up a \$500 bond, which was to arrive here Tuesday.

It was stated that dumping of logs at Groshong landing below Albany is necessary now because the Willamette river is too low at present to permit transportation of logs from Albany downstream.

Judge Barrett said that the court will wait long enough to determine the effect the log hauling will have on the Millersburg road before agreeing the limit specified in the agreement.

The court also revealed that two more logging concerns are seeking permits to operate over the road.

Jury Panel Notified

Albany—County Clerk R. M. Russell Tuesday notified members of the May term of circuit court jury panel to report at the courthouse Wednesday morning, May 8, at 10 o'clock instead of Monday morning, May 6, when they had originally been called. To be tried at that time is the case of Walter Horn vs. the Willamette Valley Lumber company, a personal injury damage case.
