

Linn County Grand Jury Orders Gambling Probe

Rumors Bring Direct Action; Trial Date Set

Albany—Judge L. H. McMahon this week-end instructed a newly drawn circuit court grand jury to investigate rumors that gambling enterprises are being conducted in Linn county, after being told that one prisoner before him for sentencing had been tempted to offend by cashing a bad check to procure money with which to gamble.

District Attorney Harlow Weinrick told the court that he and county and city officers as well as state police, had been seeking evidence of anti-gambling law violations for several months and had actually arranged for raids on suspected establishments but thus far had not succeeded in gathering sufficient proof to warrant prosecutions though one man was convicted on a gambling charge in justice court at Lebanon last fall.

Murder Case Date Set

Albany—Rufus A. Stultz is definitely scheduled to go on trial in circuit court here Monday, June 3, for the alleged murder of Alex Harju near Halcy, December 14, 1939. Stultz has been in the county jail since December 16, being held on a first degree murder charge. His trial had previously been postponed because of the delicate condition of Mrs. Stultz who is a defense witness. Stultz and Harju were both Eugene junk dealers.

Sentences Are Passed

Albany—Judge L. H. McMahon in circuit court Saturday sentenced Moulton Lindley, 23, to a year in the county jail after he had pleaded guilty to a bad check charge. Lindley had been brought back from California by Sheriff Shelton March 5, accused of passing five \$40 checks in this county. The court, paroled Lindley to District Attorney Harlow Weinrick on condition he make restitution.

Lloyd K. Lyons, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, was sentenced to a year in the state penitentiary. Lyons was taken to Salem Saturday.

Warren Duncan and Forest Heikes, charged with burglary not in a dwelling, each on two separate counts, were sentenced each to a year in the county jail but were paroled to Deputy Sheriff F. Oidham.

Red Cross Quota Fixed

Loose materials of any nature will not be accepted, nor flimsy paper boxes be accepted as containers. By order of the City Council."

Lebanon Sees Building Boom With Industry

Lebanon—Nearly \$40,000 in building permits have been issued by the city to date this year, almost two-thirds the entire sum issued in 1939 although only a little more than one third the current year's total. Observers hold that with industrial expansion now under way here there is every reason to believe 1940 permits will set a total shattering all past records by big measure. So far this quarter, estimated cost of permits comes to approximately \$26,280, compared to \$13,533 in the first three months of the year. In May alone, the totals aggregate close to \$5500.

This month's permits include three for new residences; Homer E. Mitsch, in Kirkpatrick addition, \$1000; Wilbur Parrish, Kilpatrick addition, \$1800; Vernon E. Tucker, three-room cottage at junction of Main street and Santiam highway, \$600.
