Skits and Scratches

Jimmy Crandall, who left with his Vancouver Capilanos after a four-game visit to the capital city, is quite a handy man on the baseball diamond. While with Indianapolis he was known as the Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde of the American association due to his ability to pitch or handle the big mitt back of home plate. This is his first venture as a manager.

During the summer of 1931 Jimmy joined the Pittsburgh Pirates where his father was coaching. He worked as batting practice pitcher under the watchful eye of his dad. The following year he was sent to Johnston of the Middle Atlantic loop. Then to Williamsport. He dropped out of the picture for a while when things did not break favorably.

Jim made himself over into a catcher and batted up with Kansas City and Des Moines in 1934. Wade Killefer of Indianapolis thought enough of him to put out a bit of cash and Crandall worked with the famous red-head until Killefer went to the Hollywood club. The Stars' manager later sent for Jim and he spent the seasons of 1938 and '39 with them.

Back in 1931, Crandall broke into "Believe-It-Or-Not" with a great feat of pitching at high school in Bell, Calif. He fanned 27 batters in a nine inning game. Thirty men faced him, one getting a single, one a base on balls and a third made first on an error.

Remember Andy Payne? The fellow who made the bunion derby famous back in the 1920's? Well, at 32 Andy is clerk of the Oklahoma supreme court, married to a comely former school teacher, father of two children—and he never walks any farther than he has to.

Payne won the longest marathon in history. The 20-year-old farm youth headed 64 other contestants into New York after trotting and walking 3400 miles across the continent 12 years ago. He won \$25,000 as first prize. Today he has neither business nor the \$25,000.

A big chunk of the prize money went for expenses during the 84-day grind across Uncle Sam's broad acres. Part for a car; some for knick-knacks. But he used a lot of it to pay off the mortgage on the family's 400-acre ranch. Payne's exercise now is less strenuous. It's mostly walking—six blocks to and from the office.

Yankees Snap Losing Streak Expense of Boston

Solons Take Final Contest 3 to 2 Score

The Salem Senators and the Vancouver Capilanos ended their four-game Western-International league series in a draw last night as the result of the two clubs dividing the Sunday bill. The Caps took the afternoon engagement, 7 to 5; the Solons won the night contest, 3 to 2.

A bad fourth frame ruined the Griffiths clan Sunday afternoon. The two clubs were knotted 2 to 2 as they went into the seventh. But when that affair was over the Caps had six and the Solons two. With Merrill, starting Vancouver chucker, growing a bit wild, Manager Crandall rushed Kralovich to the mound. The game was a dragsy affair, two and a half hours being consumed by the nine innings.

The night game was as peppy as the afternoon one was slow motion, and the two clubs finished their chores in exactly 1:40. Baer, Salem's hustling second sacker, settled the issue when he singled sharply back to second base to drive in Manager Griffiths with the winning run. Baer had a perfect record at bat—four singles. He was hit by the pitcher his first time up.

The Solons went out in front by a single tally in the fifth on triples by Olinger, Lightner and Baer's second single of the game. Vancouver came back on its half of the sixth to knot it two all when Crandall singled and was driven home by Quinn.

That was the way it stood until the ninth. Griffiths, first man to shoulder his bat, slapped a single into right field. Barker, hitting for Griffiths, dribbled onto the infield and both were safe when Goldman attempted to stop Griffiths at second. Lightner flew out to center field, but Baer sent the fans home in a happy frame of mind with his game-winning single.

The New York Yankees still sit at the reckoning with in the American League pennant race. The way they bounced up from the bottom of the standing yesterday to shut out the Boston Red Sox 4-0 was a forceful performance.

Red Ruffing whipped out that old fast ball and spread six hits smartly, struck out eight and walked only two. His teammates gave him superb support—no errors and two double plays.

The champs punched out their hits in familiar fashion—including two runs in the third on an error and three singles.

This not only ended the jinx left-handed pitchers had held over them and an eight game losing streak, but it also stopped a six-game winning streak for Boston.

In the National league the out-front Cincinnati Reds beat the St. Louis Cardinals 7-1 and 13-4 in a doubleheader. The double victory increased the Reds' margin to a full game over Brooklyn even though the Dodgers defeated the Phillies 5-3 with Fred Fitzsimmons' knuckleballing getting credit.

The New York Giants edged out the Boston Bees 3-2. Hal Schumacher was effective for seven innings, fanning eight.

The Chicago Cubs plastered another defeat on the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-5 when Bill Herman hit a three-run homer in the eighth. Dizzy Dean started on the mound, gave up a homer in the first inning and was belted out in the second.

The Cleveland Indians were thumped 5-3 by the St. Louis Browns when Eddien Auker rationing nine hits off his submarine ball.

The Chicago White Sox tamed the Detroit Tigers 4 to 3 in spite of home runs by Pinky Higgins and Dick Bartell.

Johnny Babich achieved his fourth victory against one defeat as the Philadelphia Athletics whipped the Washington Senators 4 to 2.
