Byrd Proposes 10 Per Cent Cut

Washington, June 1 (U.P.)—Senator Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) announced Friday that he will ask congress to impose a 10 per cent cut on all government expenses other than that for defense.

He served notice of his intention in the senate shortly after Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., urged the house ways and means committee to approve a measure lifting the \$45,000,000 debt ceiling by \$3,000,000,000 and levying 10 per cent "super taxes" for the next five years to help finance rearmament.

Byrd, leader of the senate economy bloc, said that cuts in federal expenditures of non-defense nature should be incorporated in the scheme to pay for army and navy preparations. He said that he would introduce his proposed mandatory 10 per cent cut as an amendment to the 1941 relief bill. Salaries, including those of congressmen, would be slashed under Byrd's proposal. He said that it would save \$500,000,000 a year.

Republican members of the ways and means committee sought in vain to draw from Morgenthau the exact reasons underlying President Roosevelt's additional defense fund request and he was subjected to a barrage of questions about the government's gold policy.
