Boise, Idaho, June 1 (AP)—The Rev. W. W. Deal of Nampa, former Idaho grange master, Friday resigned the Methodist pastorate he has held for 40 years.

Mr. Deal submitted his resignation at the church's state conference here. He will retire.

The Rev. H. S. Hamilton of Nampa, superintendent of the western district extending into Oregon as far west as La Grande, also retired. His successor will be named Sunday.

Red Cross Asks More Money for War Sufferers

The war relief quota of \$4000 for Marion county chapter was only a few dollars short today, according to Milton L. Meyers, chairman of the war relief committee, but said Mr. Meyers, "The end is far from in sight. The local chapter has been informed that its quota has been increased without a limit and that it is imperative for the sake of suffering fellowmen to continue contributions with generosity and promptness."

Mr. Meyers expressed gratitude for the cooperation and generosity of the people in Marion county. Especially fine, he said, has been the spirit of the large group of organizations such as the state house personnel and the public school teaching staff.

The funds received by the National Red Cross are already in action, according to word received at the local office. Sixty-seven bales of Red Cross supplies, shipped by the American Red Cross on the Pan-American Clipper plane May 26, have arrived in Paris after air transport shipment from Lisbon. Included in the shipment were supplies sent by Pacific area Red Cross chapters.

In addition, other relief supplies are now en route to France, it is announced. A French vessel carrying 198 cases and 57 bales of surgical dressings and refugee garments was cleared from New York on May 24. These supplies were consigned to the French Red Cross. Additional quantities of emergency supplies will be sent on the S. S. Washington, which sailed May 29. Larger consignments will be loaded on the Red Cross "mercy ship," the S. S. McKeesport, which will leave New York shortly after June 1. This ship has been especially chartered by the American Red Cross to transport its supplies.

Landing Troops

The Germans accompanied their assault along the Somme with an attempt to land troops by sea on the channel coast between Dunkerque and Boulogne, which they held.

Fleets of torpedo-carrying launches were directed mostly against small harbors and fishing villages. Masses of infantry, supported by tanks, planes and artillery were reported by military spokesmen to have taken part in the German attempts to force a crossing of the Somme.

The Germans found their way blocked by strong defenses which the French constructed during mopping up operations along this front last week.

Attack Day and Night

The French reported that they had liquidated the last German bridgehead on the south bank of the river in the vicinity of Abbeville.

The first German attacks were launched yesterday noon and were continued until nightfall without let-up. At dawn today the Germans returned again to the assault.

A war ministry spokesman said the battle still was continuing. The morning communiqué of the high command, describing the action, said:

"The enemy, showing the importance which it attaches to the passage of the Somme, counter-attacked in this region. This counter-attack was repulsed."

Significance in Launching Seen By Senator

Philadelphia, June 1 (AP)—Launching of the battleship Washington today was termed by Senator Walsh (D-Mass.) "the beginning of a renaissance of naval preparedness" that will make America unassailable.

"The American people," said Walsh, chairman of the senate naval committee, as he spoke at the launching ceremonies, "are determined at all costs to prepare for any eventuality that may follow the European war."

Referring to controversy over the relative merits of air power and sea power, Walsh contended that "an adequate navy, capable of meeting and defeating an enemy's navy at sea, is the only sure way that war can be kept at a safe distance from our coasts and the only sure way to bring a war to a close."

As evidence that other powers have not lost faith in the need for battleships, Walsh said Germany had recently completed two and has four under construction, Italy had completed two and has two building, Japan—on "positive information"—is building four and "it is believed that she actually has eight or more under construction." Great Britain has nine building, France has completed two and has four under construction.

He added that the United States had completed one today, would complete another on June 13 and has six under construction.

George W. Skeels, 63, Dies Suddenly

George Walter Skeels, 63, for many years superintendent of the Charles K. Spaulding Logging company, died suddenly at the family residence, 10 Morgan avenue, early this morning.

Mr. Skeels was born in Walla Walla and in 1899 he went to Springfield, Oregon, with his family. He became connected with the Spaulding company in 1905 and with the exception of short intervals was identified with that company until a year ago when a paralytic stroke caused his retirement.

Mr. Skeels was a member of the B. K. Lodge.

Services will be held from the Clough-Barick chapel, Tuesday, June 4, at 1:30 p. m., with Rev. W. Irwin Williams officiating. Interment will be at Belcrest Memorial park.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Ida Skeels; daughter, Miss Maxine Skeels; sister, Mrs. Laura Smith of Dallas; brothers, Harry of Morgan Hills, Calif., Isaac of Toledo, John of Longview, Wash.

Big Gain Made in Salem Building

The total valuation of building permits in Salem for the first five months of this year was \$59,206, records show at the office of the city building inspector, as against \$39,336 for the first five months of last year. Totals for May, this year, were \$138,633 against \$92,830 in May, last year, or 115 percents against 102.

However, in residential construction, the figures this year are lower for May, permits totaling \$62,109 against 26 permits and \$73,500.

Non-residential construction for May was 16 permits and \$61,252 against only nine permits and \$1845 in May of last year. The new Murphy building is the reason for the large increase.

May repair and alteration permits were 79 in number totaling \$15,241.

Thomas Resigns As West Salem Principal

West Salem, June 1.—Lyle D. Thomas, principal of the West Salem grade school for the past two years, served notice on the school board Saturday of his resignation, effective immediately. Thomas who has been teaching for 11 years came to this city from one of the rural schools of Lane county. In a few weeks he expects to go to Eugene for a summer session at the University of Oregon.

Thomas is only temporarily retiring from the teaching profession. In the fall he expects to enter the fur business which his father conducts in West Salem and in the winter he plans on making a bid for the speakership of the house in the next legislative assembly. Since his first successful race for representative in Polk county in 1935 he was returned in 1937 and 1939 and in the last two sessions of the assembly was chairman of the house education committee with assignment also as a member of other important committees.

With the announcement of his resignation Thomas also states definitely that he will still make his home in West Salem where he owns his residence. His family consists of Mrs. Thomas and two children, a girl, 6, and a boy, 4. The matter of a successor to Principal Thomas will probably be taken up at the next meeting of the school board.

Greider to be 'Y' Director

Carlton B. Greider, who is connected with the Humboldt branch of the Buffalo, N. Y., association, has accepted the position of director of physical education of the Salem YMCA. He will report either early in July or September, depending upon when he can be released from his present duties.

"I am very happy to accept a position with your association and you may rest assured that I shall try my best to give you more than satisfactory results," Greider states in a letter of acceptance to C. A. Keils, secretary of the Salem Y. Greider will succeed Fred Smith with whom he was associated while they were enrolled at the Springfield, Mass. YMCA college a few years ago. Smith has assumed the duties of boys work secretary and in this capacity will have charge of camping activities.

Greider is 24 years old and is married. His home is Wichita, Kan., where he acquired his high school diploma in 1933. He graduated from Springfield in 1938 where he was a member of the freshman varsity football and gymnastic teams. He studied under a scholarship at the German nation school of physical education, Berlin, in 1936-37 and also for a short time in Nik Bukh gymnastic school, Ollerup, Denmark.

While at Springfield, Greider majored in health and physical education.

Salem Box Plant Goes to Two Shifts

Beginning Monday the Salem Box company will operate two shifts at its factory in West Salem, due to an increased business now opening for the summer months.

The company is operating on a large box business for China, a trade that formerly went to Norway and Sweden. The output for the China trade is about five carloads a month.

A new business with the plant is the manufacture of cut stock, a demand for the stock having been created by the federal housing act. Paper mill frames, used for the protection of paper in shipment, is another business that has developed to an important degree.

During the first five months of this year the company's business showed an increase of 59 per cent over the corresponding period of last year.

All But One British Division Escapes Trap

The home-coming Tommies, saved from annihilation by their comrades' brilliant rear guard action, said the single British division and two divisions of General Rene Jacques Adolphe Proux's French army were the only allied troops still covering the Dunkerque retreat.

45,000 Left

This would mean that only some 45,000 men were left in Flanders of the 270,000 allied troops which originally were trapped.

General Lord Gort, B.E.F. commander in chief, was likened by the British press to Sir John Moore, hero of the Pinarus war who saved his army from annihilation by Napoleon's troops. Returning soldiers said Gort had taken personal command of the rear guard fighting.

While all of London's evening papers proclaimed the Germans had lost half a million men in their attempt to wipe out the B.E.F., an official announcement said the allied supreme war council met yesterday in Paris and reached a full agreement regarding all measures which the situation calls for.

Sky Battles Rage

Boatloads of soldiers moved steadily across the channel. The movement was screened by the Royal Air Force, which shot down 56 German planes yesterday, with a loss of 16 British ships, and shot down 14 Nazi fighters and seriously damaged five more over Dunkerque this morning.

The air ministry said the battle in the skies yesterday raged unceasingly while the allied withdrawal continued. German bombers, protected by swarms of fighters, came over hour after hour and the ministry said, the Royal Air Force fighters "waged relentless war against them."

Northern France Flaming Torch

With the French bomber command on the Northern Front, June 1 (AP)—Seen from the air from a French plane at night, the entire northern front of France looks like a flaming torch.

I have just made a long night reconnaissance flight over the northern battlefields.

The red glow from the flaming cities and towns gave the low-hanging night clouds the appearance of a late summer sunset.

Far below the battle lines on the Somme and Aisne rivers, flashes of artillery fire looked like matches flaring.

To the north and east there was an almost continuous line of burning towns—Cambrai, St. Quentin, Arras, Peronne, Valenciennes—linked by smoldering fires in the little villages between.

Most of these were fired by incendiary bombs and torch-bearing parachutists days ago, but still the flames rise.

Holiday Death Toll Increased

(By the United Press)

More than 200 persons are dead today, victims of accidents and violence during the Memorial day week-end.

The toll mounted rapidly as the nation's workers celebrated the four-day holiday and many started on vacations. Highway accidents led all the rest and accounted for more than 100 of the victims. Thirty-eight were drowned.

California led the states with 29 dead, 12 in highway accidents. Pennsylvania and New York reported 26 deaths each. Michigan had 16 deaths. Indiana 13, Ohio 10 and Wisconsin and West Virginia 9 each. Highway accidents caused most of these deaths.

The total was smaller than for some holidays because many southern states do not observe Memorial day, but the national safety council estimated that the Memorial week-end toll would mount to almost 500, the same number killed in 1938 when Memorial day was on Monday.

R.A.F. Destroys 40 Planes at Dunkerque

London, June 1 (AP)—The Royal Air Force destroyed 40 German airplanes in the Dunkerque zone today and an additional 33 were reported destroyed or seriously damaged, the air ministry said today.

The ministry's communiqué also said that a successful attack again was made on oil depots at German-held Rotterdam yesterday where there were huge explosions.

An earlier air ministry statement said navy planes had sunk a German torpedo boat and destroyed or damaged 66 German planes in the Dunkerque area.

Health Program To be Continued All Summer

An enlarged program of physical examinations for certain children of school age, including those who take part in competitive athletics, will be undertaken by the Marion county department of health during the summer and fall. Announcement of the plan was made following a joint meeting of health department officials, physical education teachers and principals of senior and junior high schools. It is proposed to give thorough physical examinations of first graders, as well as sophomores in high school and those students entering junior high for the first time. It is the hope of the health department that many of these examinations can be made during the summer months, in order that any defects may be taken care of before class work begins next fall.

Physical tests of athletes will be made before the training period starts as well as before actual contests.

All food handlers connected with the school cafeterias will come up for thorough examination.

As a part of the health program a series of physical examinations for children of pre-school age will be held during next week. The schedule calls for the following clinics:

Monday—Forenoon, Grant school.
Tuesday—Forenoon, Grant school, and Eugene Field school, Silverton.
Wednesday—All day, Englewood school.

Thursday—Forenoon, Richmond and Englewood schools; afternoon, Richmond.

Additional clinics for the week consist of milk and food handlers at health department Monday afternoon; infant and health department, Thursday forenoon; vaccination, immunizations and tuberculosis tests at health department Saturday forenoon.

Jury Criticizes Court Leniency

Portland, June 1 (AP)—The Multnomah county grand jury criticized leniency of the courts toward ex-convicts Friday and urged the state parole board extend its investigations.

"We found in many cases that ex-convicts who had been paroled were only out of prison a few weeks when they were again committing crimes," the jury reported to Presiding Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson.

"In the matter of paroles it is our recommendation that the state parole board check more carefully into the background of the prisoners and also into the possibility of what they may be able to do once they are paroled before paroles are granted."

The report forced legislative change for voluntary manslaughter laws because convictions are difficult to obtain if the penalty is too severe.

to be able to order a partial mobilization by executive authority alone. Senators Wheeler (D-Mont.), Nye (R-N.D.) and Bridges (R-N.H.), seconded this view.

Senator Austin (R-Vt.), a consistent supporter of the Roosevelt foreign policy, said the proposal was "unfortunate" and would "have an adverse effect on harmony between the president and congress."

"What does he know that we don't know that would justify him in implying that it would be necessary to call out the national guard to enforce neutrality?" he inquired.

Not to Be Used

Secretary Woodring sought to clarify the situation with a statement explaining that the war department had asked that the war authority be sought but had no present intention of using it.

If it should later become necessary to call out the national guard, Woodring said, the initial purpose would be to give the men field training and seasoning such as is given the regular army.

General George C. Marshall, army chief-of-staff, it was recalled recently told a congressional committee he opposed guard mobilization as long as it could be avoided. He pointed out that it would draw men away from jobs connected with the defense program.

For Emergency Only

Supporting the presidential request for national guard power, Senator Sheppard (D-Tex.) said he approved because "we must be prepared for any emergency. Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the house military committee, announced that the necessary legislation would be introduced Monday and quickly passed along to the house for action.

In asking for more rearmament funds, Mr. Roosevelt said that "the almost incredible events of the past two weeks" in Europe made the money necessary to hasten prompt and big deliveries of guns, ammunition and fire control equipment, and also to train a vast group of specialists for work in industry and in army and navy service.

Chadwick, the parade will include grand corps officers, Portland tent drill team, color guard and drill team, Rosarian high drill team and color guard, men's and women's drill teams of Liberty high, Portland; Oregon drill team, Portland and similar groups from Salem, Willamette and Corvallis.

The Master Band band of Salem and one from Woodburn will provide music for the marchers. The Salem Centennial will be represented by the Centennial theme girl in her phaeton, Whiskerites, stages, the sheriff's posse, drum majorettes from Canby and similar groups.

Plans for the parade have been in charge of John Riches, commander of Capitol tent, Salem, while Mrs. Anna Kuth, also of Salem, has been chairman of arrangements for the rally, which is being given in honor of the birthday of H. S. Hudson, Portland, grand commander of Maccabees for Oregon.
