The crowd was estimated at 10,000, saw the children's parade at 10:30 o'clock and heard the address of Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland just following noon. Preparedness was the keynote of the Carson address.

Woodburn May Hold Special Bond Election

Power Problem Council Topic Tuesday Night

Woodburn—The Woodburn city council will be asked, when they meet in regular session Tuesday night, to call a special election for the issuance of \$65,000 in bonds, the proceeds to be used for municipal power development here. The request will be submitted by a citizens committee, of which George A. Landon is chairman, appointed last year by Mayor H. M. Austin to study municipal electric operation here.

A public meeting was held Friday night at the Legion rooms in the city hall when the report, furnished the committee by the Jaggard-Stouffe company of Portland, was presented to the citizens concerning the cost of electric distributing facilities and power revenues.

According to the figures presented, a new distribution system could be built in Woodburn for \$65,000. It could pay all operating expenses, including taxes and provide rates now offered at Canby, which buys power from Bonneville, and with a 75-cent monthly minimum.

Woodburn is now being served by the Portland General Electric company which has no franchise here. Local sentiment is in favor of buying the existing system if it can be bought for what it is worth. If the PGE company refuses to sell the city may, if it desires, build a duplicating system and then order the PGE company to remove its equipment from the city streets.

Relief Funds Are Swelled By Donations

Dallas—Over \$500 has been turned in on the \$800 quota which was assigned Polk county by the American Red Cross organization, according to Mrs. C. N. Bilyeu, secretary of the Polk county Red Cross chapter. The money is part of the \$20,000,000 European war relief fund which is being raised for the relief of war victims in Europe.

Of the \$500 collected, Monmouth reported \$125 and Willamette valley camp above Black Rock contributed \$161.50, with the balance being from Dallas. The Itinerary-Observer office, the office of Mrs. Bilyeu or the office of Dr. A. B. Starbuck, chairman of the Polk county chapter and head of the county drive, are the places to leave contributions.

Response Is Good

Lebanon—Response to the local drive to secure funds to extend further aid to stricken allies in the war zone is very satisfactory, according to Mrs. Joel Mayer, chairman of the committee making the drive. Up to Wednesday, Lebanon residents had subscribed \$225 of the \$350 quota. Since that money was turned over to the county Red Cross officials, more subscriptions have been received and the workers expected to complete the quota by Saturday evening. Linn county's quota was set at \$1600 for the drive.

Campaign Is Lagging

Albany—The campaign to raise \$3200 in Linn county for Red Cross war relief work in Belgium, northern France and Holland, is lagging badly. It was shown Saturday by Linn county chapter headquarters.

A total of \$559.25 had been turned in up to this morning, nearly half of that having been received from Lebanon on Wednesday. Most of the remainder came from a canvass of the Albany business section.

While several towns have not been heard from at all and a number of organizations which have promised aid have not reported amounts, reports thus far received show that donations will have to come faster and more freely if Linn county is to reach even the original quota of \$1600. It was stated by R. H. Collins, chapter chairman.
