

Stults Murder Trial Evidence Is Presented

Albany—District Attorney Harlow Weirick Tuesday resumed his endeavor in circuit court to weave about Rufus A. Stults a web of circumstances nullifying Stults' anticipated effort to convince the jury that he slew Alex Harju December 14 in Halsey in self-defense.

The state has called upon Farley Mogan, state trooper, who took fingerprints of Harju after his body had been found by Carl Peterson, rural mail carrier, who also was on the witness stand, as well as County Engineer Walter Larson, who was called upon to explain a plat mapping the scene of the alleged murder and the place where Peterson found the body half submerged in water.

Larsen was followed by Deputy Sheriff Frank Ganslee, Halsey, State Police Sergeant Earl B. Houston, Mrs. Henry Kirk, E. E. Carey, Margaret and Robert Carey, who live near Halsey; Roy Stenberg, Deputy Coroner Walter Kropp and J. S. Murray, state identification officer.

The Halsey people told of meeting a truck on Miller lane the night of the alleged murder while they were en route to a basketball game at Halsey.

Stenberg testified concerning his transportation of scraps of junk found near the body of Harju, which was offered in evidence purporting to link Stults and Harju in a junk selling enterprise, proceeds of which the state contends Stults took from Harju's body after murdering him.

School Voters Approve New Addition Plan

Lebanon—By a proportion of exactly two to one, qualified voters of school district 16 voted approval Monday night of a plan to erect a \$10,000 addition to Queen Anne school, and also endorsed the tentative 1940-1941 budget.

The vote on the expansion program was 92 to 46, and on the budget 102 to 35, a ratio of almost three to one.

The building addition will be financed by a special levy which will bring the total tax to some 27 mills, authorities believe. This year's levy is 21.1 mills.

A special meeting of the school board has been called for next Monday night so that an architect may be hired immediately and plans and specifications drafted at once. It is the objective of the board to complete the addition before the reopening of school next fall.

The total budget is \$68,789.16 and estimated receipts are \$35,450. The district tax amounts to \$33,339.16.

Monday evening, June 17, is the date of the annual meeting, when directors and a clerk will be elected, and the yearly report will be made.

Postal Business Grows

Lebanon—May business at the Lebanon post office was greater than the corresponding month a year ago, but was reduced somewhat under April volume, according to announcement Tuesday of Postmaster Merrill Smith. This is the fifth consecutive month that volume has increased over similar periods last year. May receipts were \$1587, compared to \$1528 in May 1939, and \$1624 in April 1940.
