

Silverton Has Prospect of Metallurgical Concern

Water Quality Found Necessary For Operation

Silverton—Lon Shannon met with members of the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce last night and spent the day in Silverton yesterday consulting members of the planning council in the interests of establishing a Metallurgical plant in the vicinity.

Shannon, a proprietor of the Concentration plant being constructed at the junction of Battle Ax creek and the North fork of the Santiam, 27 miles from Mehama, explained that under the present set-up, 100 tons of concentrates are hauled daily by truck to Lyons from where they are shipped to Selby, Calif., for smelter refining for content of lead, zinc, copper, gold and silver and where also the company is "docked" because of the sulphur content found in the concentrates.

Shannon explained that with the planned electro-metallurgical plant, in a district where cold water is plentiful, this by-product of sulphur would be utilized and made a feature of the plant on account of the near-by paper mills of the Willamette valley that are now compelled to ship in 200 thousand tons annually, from Texas and Louisiana, for the operation of their pulp mills.

The metallurgical plants would require 200 acres of ground and 500 men would be employed, he said.

Shannon mentioned the deplorable condition of the 15 miles of county road of the 27 miles from Mehama to their concentration plant, and said he hoped for cooperation in improvement in the near future.

A little city is rising on the North Santiam at the site of the hydro-electric plant with cottages of from one to five rooms, equipped with electricity and other modern conveniences, nearing completion where families of employees may reside.

The North Santiam project has been under construction for many months.

All but two of those signing the remonstrance had petitioned earlier this year for the improvement, and the council had ordered the paving accordingly.

Special Election is Called For Power Issue

Woodburn Will Decide Question \$65,000 Bonds

Woodburn—At the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night City Attorney McCord was instructed to draw up a charter amendment authorizing a special election on the question of a \$65,000 bond issue for a power distribution system. The action was taken at the request of the citizens' committee, represented by George A. Landon, chairman, as the result of a vote taken at a public meeting last Friday.

The council voted to call for bids for a new 500-gallon turbine pump to be installed at the new well recently completed in Library square. Bids will be opened at the next meeting, June 13.

A representative of a pinball machine company was present and asked for an exclusive permit to operate pinball machines in the city. He stated that the type of machine he wished to install was one involving amusement and skill only and had no gambling features. The council deferred action on his request.

Water Superintendent Kleinmuth was authorized to buy repairs for two of the old pumps in the city pump house which are used only in case of emergency.

John Muir, street commissioner, was instructed to remove the tall grass from vacant lots.

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Stults Appears On Stand in Own Defense

Albany—Groundwork for the defense of Rufus A. Stults, one-armed junkman, against an accusation of first degree murder, was laid in part by his attorneys in circuit court Wednesday with the appearance of the defendant himself as their first witness.

Stults was called to the stand after the state had rested its case in the morning with the reading of a deposition. The state had called in all 27 witnesses in addition to introducing the deposition and had recalled two of Tuesday's witnesses Wednesday.

Stults was on the witness stand until late Wednesday afternoon, and was followed by the appearance of Dr. John Evans, psychiatrist, Portland. Examination of Stults was to give background to the events and circumstances leading up to the trip he and Alex Harju, of whose murder Stults is accused, made from Eugene to Portland and return December 14, and also of the fight that ensued en route back to Eugene.

Stults is alleged to have killed Harju in a fight over money matters. Stults and Harju had taken a load of junk and scrap iron to Portland and a quarrel was held over division of the proceeds from the sale of the scrap iron, it was alleged.

Harju was found the morning of December 15, lying in a drainage ditch on a market road off the Pacific highway near Halsey by Carl Peterson, rural mail carrier.

It is believed that the trial will come to a close Thursday or Friday morning.

Battery Will Train
Albany—Preparations are being made by Battery D, 24th coast artillery, under command of Captain Charles J. Olvis, to proceed Tuesday to Camp Clatsop for their annual training camp. This year, Captain Olvis said, the Albany battery will be introduced to the U.S. army's new anti-aircraft guns, which are being supplied to all national guard units assigned to this type of defense.
