Figures Show Operation of New Income Tax

Washington, June 6 (AP)—How would the proposed new income tax affect your tax payment?

The house tax subcommittee voted yesterday to lower exemptions from \$2500 to \$2000 for married persons or heads of families, and from \$1000 to \$800 for single persons.

After you figured your regular tax, under the pending bill, you would add 10 per cent as a "super tax."

Here are some comparisons between present payments of typical wage-earners and the proposed taxes. They are based on the present 4 per cent normal tax, and subtract the 10 per cent deduction for earned income but not such permissible deductions as charity, bad debts, etc.

Governors End Duluth Meeting

Duluth, Minn., June 6 (AP)—A half dozen of the nation's governors who last night ended a four-day conference on state and national problems, returned to their homes today, leaving behind them a grim picture of a nation faced with necessity of preparing to meet the threat of an invasion.

Governor Lloyd C. Stark of Missouri, retiring chairman of the executive committee of the national governors' conference, sounded the gloomy note in his final speech last night.

With German armies battering the French lines along the Somme river, he said, "It looks as though the other two great democracies in the world (France and England) are going under."

"That leaves only the United States and we cannot hope to remain immune from attack for long," Governor Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, host to the conference,

Art Center Observes Founders' Day Sunday

One of the most impressive affairs ever held at the Art Center will be the third Founders' day reception Sunday afternoon from 2 to 6 o'clock. Elaborate plans are being detailed by the Founders' day committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. M. Devers for a special program in tribute to all Salem people who were responsible for the initial and continued efforts to establish and support the Center in Salem.

Annually observed in celebration of the first birthday of Founders' Day, the occasion this year will be marked by the preview of an outstanding anniversary exhibition, 19 original oil paintings by internationally famous artists, lent by the permanent collection of the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis and the Portland Art Museum especially for this exhibition. This group of landscapes, which comprises the most important show the Center has ever presented, illustrates the development of the conservative tradition of landscape painting.

Starting with a splendid example by John Constable, the first great English landscape painter, continuing with works by Corot, Rousseau, Diaz, and others of the Barbizon school, the exhibition is concluded with a review of American landscape painting from Thomas Cole to Arthur B. Davies. This anniversary show will be hung in the main gallery for three weeks following Founders' Day.

The Art Center opened two years ago with a special exhibition of art in the Public Schools, and this favorite feature has been continued annually as a part of the Founders' Day program. Mrs. Ida M. Andrews has the direction of the display of school art this year, which will be on view in the two hall galleries for this Sunday.
