

David H. Looney, Pioneer, Dies At Farm Home

Jefferson, June 7.—David H. Looney, 90, prominent farmer and stockman, and who for several years served Marion county in the state legislature, died Thursday evening at his farm home near Jefferson after a lingering illness.

He was born December 10, 1849, on the donation land claim of his father, Jesse Looney, pioneer of 1843, a farm home that has been continuously in the family since pioneer days. He was married in 1885 to Jessie K. Thompson, who, with their two children, Addie Looney Huffman and Harold B. Looney, have passed away. He is survived by his widow, Lona George Looney; one son, George; a grandson, David; and two sisters, Mrs. Frances Cornell of Salem and Mrs. Addie Fairbanks of Willets, Calif.

Funeral services will be held at the farm home Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. W. C. Kantner of Salem will officiate and interment will be in the family cemetery.

Mr. Looney was a progressive type of citizen who took an active part in the affairs of his community, supervising his farm and retaining an interest in public affairs until his last illness. He was twice elected to the legislature. For over

Two Danger Spots in Weygand's Line

Allied Generalissimo Weygand's tank-trap battle-line was reported as holding firmly against renewed German attacks this morning, but it had developed two danger-spots

yesterday — Nazi progress on both flanks of the offensive sector to which I draw your special attention. Also in order to keep our perspective it should be noted that while the enemy successes to low-gear in this battle of France, the German army isn't yet in full cry. Hitler has a lot of power in reserve to throw into the drive.

It is well to keep in mind that terrible fighting is ahead, and that the allies certainly will be wading up to their necks in sweat and blood before they get relief from the pressure of the most powerful war machine ever constructed.

Now as to those two danger points, and we'll avoid technicalities as much as possible. One of these developed where the French left flank rested on the coast by the mouth of the Somme, close to Abbeville.

The Germans made a furious assault on the allies' extreme wing by the sea and managed in the face of fierce resistance to drive down the coast 17 miles. Much of the fighting here was desperate, hand-to-hand work and the defenders held well in view of the stronger mechanized forces opposing them.

The second heavy German assault was made in the zone of the Aisne river and carried the invaders to the famous Chemin Des Dames. This is a road running along the crest of the hills east of Soissons.

The Chemin Des Dames is 40 miles north of Paris and is one of the bulwarks of the capital's defenses. You probably will recall that this ridge was the scene of some of the heaviest fighting of the World war.

Last night, after the Germans had slackened, the French counter-attacked. This was proceeding this morning. The point of this procedure, of course, is that the flexible French line sustains far less shock than as though it tried to impose an iron front to the assault.

Report Selassie Leading Troops In Ethiopia

Rome, June 7 (AP)—Authoritative Italian sources said today that Haile Selassie, former emperor of Ethiopia, may be leading 8000 troops of his former army along the Kenya-Ethiopian frontier. It was claimed that Italy and Britain were massing soldiers in the East African danger zone and that minor border incidents already had occurred.

Most of the Italian troops reported massing on the Ethiopian-Kenya frontier were described as natives, including 20,000 Askaris — forces raised and trained in Eritrea and Italian Somaliland.

Ethiopian cavalrymen and members of the Libyan camel corps also were said to have been mustered for patrol duty by the Italians.

Italian sources said that if the Negus was not leading his forces in person they were being commanded by one of his former lieutenants at the head of Ethiopians who fought Italy in 1935 and 1936.

One report said that the Ethiopians were concentrating in the Fort Harrington region near Moyale.

Italian reports from Ethiopia said that Haile Selassie, an exile in England after he fled Ethiopia in 1936, some time ago left England un-noticed and went to the Sudan area adjoining Ethiopia.

Then, it was said, when it was indicated that Italy might abandon her non-belligerency policy the Negus went to Kenya to gather his former followers about him. Italian reports said that the Negus might have entrusted command of his troops to one of his lieutenants so that he could return to England to report on the military situation.

London, June 7 (AP)—Former Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia was said today to be at Bath where he has lived in retirement since the Italian conquest of Ethiopia.

Survey for City Lighting Rates

The office of the Portland General Electric company said today that the company is making a survey to determine what adjustment in electric lighting rates can be made for the city of Salem.

The monthly bill of the company for street lighting has been held up, Alderman George L. Belt, chairman of the light committee of the city council, said yesterday, until a reasonable basis for the charge is offered by the company. The city's contract with the company expired April 1. The city has been paying the company over \$25,000 a year for street lighting.

Belt said his committee had suggested to the company that a survey be made to reach conclusions on the matter of rates and needed improvement in lighting equipment. He said also a request had been made to the Bonneville authority for a survey with the possibility of getting energy through the West Salem sub-station for street lighting in Salem.
