

License Approved for Pinball and Marble Boards

Independence Will Play Only For Amusement

Independence — At the regular meeting of the city council an ordinance was passed permitting the operation of pin and marble machines for amusement only in the city. The ordinance provides for a fee of \$5 per quarter for each machine and prohibits minors under 18 from playing them. It also provides a fine of not to exceed \$50 for violation of the ordinance.

A protest was entered against the ordinance on peddling within the city, but the council disregarded the protest.

The local manager of the Mountain State Power Co. called the attention of the council to the need of an extension of the sewer outlet so as not to endanger contamination of the city water supply. This was referred to the street commission with power to act.

The matter of public rest rooms at the Hop Bowl was discussed and an estimate of cost made by a local plumber, at around \$400.

Vacation for the local police was considered and they were granted one week's leave of absence on full pay during June.

On recommendation of Fire Chief George Wood and a petition signed by members of the local fire department, the council ordered the siren sounded for all fires. Formerly only the chief was called in case of chimney fires.

An agreement was signed with the state highway department for the installation of a stop for the high curb on Main street after a letter from the highway commission was read changing objectionable clauses in the agreement.

Councilman Barnum reported the finances of the city in good shape and money enough provided in the budget to complete operations for the balance of the year.
