

Hamilton Sees Grave Danger In Third Term

Washington, June 13 (AP)—John Hamilton, chairman of the republican national committee, declared today that "there is very grave danger to our democratic institutions in the prospect of a third term and all that it implies in the trend toward totalitarianism in this country."

In a formal statement before leaving with his staff for Philadelphia, where the republican national convention opens June 24, Hamilton added that "the people must look to the republican party in the peace of the nation to be preserved."

He disclosed that party leaders expected at least 10 candidates to be placed in the running for the presidential nomination at the convention.

The red-haired chairman received reporters at party headquarters after Wendell L. Willkie, late entrant in the republican presidential race, had spoken out against the new deal except for its foreign policy. Willkie left here for an eastern campaign tour.

Hamilton said that nominating and seconding speeches at the convention would be limited to 50 minutes each.

Tickets for the sessions, he added, had been printed for five days instead of the customary four. It was conceivable, he explained, that the convention might last a full week but he thought it could be confined to five days.

In his formal statement he asserted the convention would be the most important in the party's history because, "it occurs at a time of unparalleled crisis in both domestic and national affairs, when the leadership of the republican party is needed as never before."

The people, he continued, will look to the republicans to rescue them "from the mire of dependency in which the inept, extravagant and wasteful new deal administration has enveloped the American people."

Willkie, whose eleventh-hour entrance into the Philadelphia convention contest he describes as a "Topsy-turvy" candidacy, threw down the gauntlet to the new deal on everything except its foreign policy in talking to reporters yesterday. He left last night for New York.

Turner to Vote On \$3000 Bonds

The city of Turner will vote on a \$3000 bond issue Saturday and not a bond issue for \$20,000, as indicated in a special dispatch to the Capital Journal from Turner, Mrs. Halie C. Endicott, mayor, informed the paper this morning. Joining with her in the statement, following a special meeting of the council last night, were Henry Bower, Albert Jensen and J. S. McKinney, councilmen.

"A wrong impression might easily be created by the previously published news story," Mayor Endicott said today. "The bonds to be voted upon relative to improvement of the water mains and obtaining Salem city water, are not to exceed \$3000. The change in water system is cooperative as a WPA project and the bond issue is only to provide the city's share of the cost, she said. Eventually, if further extensions are made, the total improvement might be worth the amount erroneously credited to the proposed bond issue."

Yarn Available For Sweaters For Refugees

"Where do you want these two bales of yarn delivered?" the Red Cross office was asked this morning and when the inquirer was told to bring them to the office there was a questioning protest. "Do you know they are about the size of two big trucks?"

But they were delivered and are now ready to be separated into small bundles each containing enough yarn for sweaters for women, children and men refugees from war. The work of bundling will be done by volunteer assistance in the Red Cross office, according to Mrs. C. S. Hamilton, production chairman.

In addition to the work of getting yarn out and made into garments there will begin tomorrow at the small school building on Grant school grounds, the wholesale cutting of dresses for women and children European war refugees. This work will be under the direction of Miss Dollie Allingham.

Mrs. John Pollock has spent many volunteer hours the past days getting together groups of cutters and will still welcome offers of help from anyone expert at cutting. Mrs. Pollock's telephone number is 8205.

Volunteers, individuals and groups are registering for sewing to do as soon as it is ready for distribution. Committee on distribution includes Mrs. John Pollock, Mrs. F. A. Elliott and Mrs. E. J. Seelars.

The Salem school board has made it possible for a large cutting room and sewing room to be arranged in the small school building on Grant school grounds. Six large tables from Salem senior high school domestic science departments have been donated for the summer for cutting tables, and four electric sewing machines have also been made available. This will allow for groups to work under supervision.

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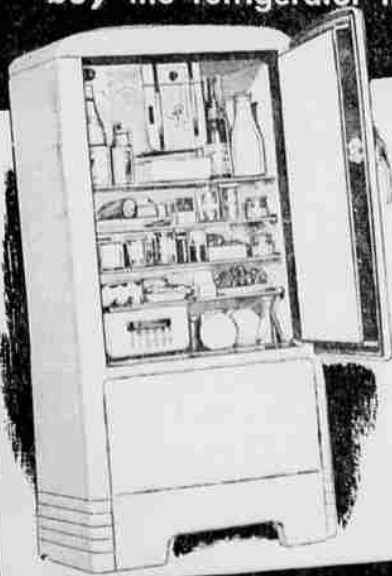
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
