RADIO Day by Day

Time to Pacific Standard

New York, June 13 (AP)—The radio networks are completing plans for the quadrennial broadcast of the republican national convention in Philadelphia 10 days from now.

Each chain, NBC, CBS and ABC, says it will strive to broadcast all details, including any night sessions from June 24 until adjournment. The usual policy of sidetracking program schedules sponsored or otherwise, will be followed.

Day sessions are expected to go on the air around 9 a. m. and night sessions at 8 p. m. Numerous commentaries and other time periods are being arranged.

The first telecast of a political convention is being arranged by NBC and Philco for New York and Philadelphia viewers.

Twelve men, all experts on the subject, have combined in symposium style to produce a new book, "We Present Television," written in non-technical language. The volume endeavors to give as nearly a complete picture of television and its part toward public attention as is possible in a dozen 6,000 word chapters.

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Mrs. Shea Wins Damage Award

Washington, June 13 (AP)—Payment of \$161.30 by the treasury to Mrs. Anna M. Shea of Portland, Ore., for compensation and reimbursement for medical and hospital expenses was ordered in a bill signed by President Roosevelt.

Mrs. Shea was injured when the car in which she was a passenger was struck by a Washington county bus driven by a WPA employee in Portland, June 13, 1936. WPA officials said they believed the WPA driver was at fault.

Molalla People All Dressed Up For Buckaroo

Molalla — Molalla citizens are "dressed up" for the 17th annual Molalla Buckaroo scheduled for July 4, 5, 6 and 7. Boosters of the big round-up are wearing 10 gallon hats and brightly colored shirts for which this western city is well known.

Plans for the round-up are materializing rapidly and directors of the association have announced that all Boy Scouts bearing credentials will be admitted for 25 cents on Friday, July 5. Special features for the youngsters will be provided this day.

Nationally known cowboys are sending in their entry blanks, competition to be furnished by wild horses from eastern Oregon, ferocious Brahman steers, Texas longhorns and speedy calves. The "king" of the Brahmas is "Speedy," the big bull who has not been ridden for three years. The Molalla Buckaroo association has offered a \$50 special prize to any cowboy who rides him during the show. "Speedy" just can't be tamed. He was in all kinds of trouble last year and nearly wrecked the round-up fences and corals.

Diamond Dewey, who makes his headquarters in Los Angeles, will entertain the young and old in the role of clown. He performs with his trained buffalo.

The Buckaroo directors announce that there will be parades, carnival dances and on the night of July 4, there will be free fireworks. The afternoon shows start at 2 o'clock.

Court News

Circuit Court

Verdict for \$1000 damages was returned by the jury in the case of Mrs. O. Scott vs. Don Madison in Judge McMahon's court yesterday afternoon after a three-day trial. Action was instituted for injuries to the plaintiff's husband when she dived from a motor boat driven by Madison on the Willamette river.

Complaint for \$500 allegedly due for work and services has been filed by William Martin vs. William Peerenboom.

Germa Bell as administratrix of the estate of John L. Bell, has filed a \$10,000 damage action against Frank E. Brown, George S. Hoffman and Claude W. Gifford, all of whom are alleged to have conspired to defraud the plaintiff. The complaint states the plaintiff is widow of John L. Bell and she is instituting the action for benefit of her minor child, the deceased. She states that George S. Hoffman, dentist, extracted a tooth for deceased August, that infection set in and spread to the head and throat. She says Hoffman sent him to Claude W. Gifford, dentist, and later Frank E. Brown, physician and surgeon, was called in. She states that the deceased was placed in a chair and gas applied and that deceased died in not to exceed a minute after application of the gas and that the physical condition of the deceased was such as to make it impossible for him to take the gas.

Complaint has been filed by Albert and Elizabeth Dornbusch vs. Melvin, Helen and Marie Johnson in which it is alleged that they purchased five acres of land in Clatsop county and Garden tracts and that they seek relief on representations of the defendants who pointed out the land to them. However, they allege that reservation was made of certain property in the deed which caused them to receive less land than was pointed out to them. They ask that defendants be required to convey the land which they alleged was reserved or in lieu thereof pay them \$354.85.

Execution from transcript in justice court has been filed in the case of Carl & Bowersox vs. E. M. and Ivy F. Anderson.

A jury in circuit court today started trial of the case of P. A. Mignot, administrator of the estate of Bertha A. Mignot vs. George Hartwell and Elmer Whelan Motor Freight, Inc., involving a three-way accident on the Pacific highway between Woodburn and Hubbard September 17, 1938. The complaint asks \$10,000 damages. It alleges that the deceased was driving north on the highway, that a Silver Wheel motor truck was driving south as was a truck owned and operated by Hartwell, that the Hartwell truck attempted to pass the other truck and a collision resulted, the Hartwell truck, it being alleged, was thrown against the car driven by deceased and that her death resulted. Each of the defendants denies that the accident was due to the negligence of such answering defendant.

Open Bids on 10 Projects for Highway Jobs

Portland, June 13 (AP)—Lane county delegates asked the state highway commission today to make an early decision on the Pacific highway route through Eugene.

The tentative plan would send southbound traffic along Seventh, Pearl and Broadway streets and northbound automobiles entering on Broadway would leave by way of High and Sixth streets. All the lanes but Broadway would be one-way.

The commission received bids on ten projects. No offers were made for the John Day section of the John Day highway in Grant county, the first time such an incident has occurred in several years.

A Morrow county group asked surfacing of the Oregon-Washington highway east of Heppner and completion of two secondary roads. Grants Pass requested elimination of a dip at the Pacific highway-Redwood highway junction.

Egypt to Fight If Invaded

Cairo, June 13 (AP)—Premier Aly Maher Pasha declared today that while Egypt's policy basically is defensive, she will declare war, presumably on Italy, if her territory is invaded or any Egyptian point is bombed. His statement followed severance of Egyptian diplomatic relations with Italy.

Count Serafino Mazzolini, Italian minister, has been handed his passport and asked to name a country to take charge of Italian affairs, it was understood.

It was believed that in dismantling Mazzolini the foreign office had stipulated that the Egyptian minister at Rome must reach a neutral state safely before Mazzolini and his staff left Egypt.

Egyptian police intensified a round-up of Italians and quickly brought the total of those held to 500.

It was understood that leaders of the Italian fascist party in Egypt had left the country several weeks ago.

Japan Demands Troops Leave

Shanghai, June 13 (AP)—The Japanese controlled "central Chinese government" at Nanking published a declaration tonight demanding that all troops, warships and other armed forces of European belligerents stationed in China be withdrawn.

The Nanking regime, headed by Wang Ching-wei and acting under Japanese advice, said it was interested only in avoiding any "unfortunate incidents" in China.

It pointed out that Britain, France and Italy all have forces in China—in many cases stationed in the same localities.

"In this critical period," it said, "the presence of belligerent troops is likely to result in conflict which may develop to serious proportions."

Give Up Hope of Early Adjournment

Washington, June 13 (AP)—Speaker William B. Bankhead said today he had given up hope for an adjournment of congress June 22.

Asked whether a prolonged session would mean opening of the billion-dollar defense tax bill to general revision, Bankhead said:

"We are not going to do that. Even the republicans on the house committee recommended that that be left for study. I don't think that will be accomplished at this session of congress."

Bankhead said leaders had discussed the problem of recessing during the national convention period but had reached no decision. The republican convention begins June 24; the democratic July 15.

Blanket Agreement Covers Dispute

Sausalito, Calif., June 13 (AP)—A blanket agreement covering wages, hours and working conditions throughout northern California will be sought by the AFL northern California district council of lumber and sawmill workers in negotiations with lumber operators August 1.

The AFL said wage increases would be asked, and that the unions would support employers who signed contracts in opening new markets for their products.

Eugene Youth Held in 'Frisco

San Francisco, June 13 (AP)—A one-month pose by 18-year-old Wolfgang Eberwein as a University of California hospital interne ended in city prison today with the Eugene, Ore., youth, arrested on suspicion of robbery, burglary and passing bad checks.

Police seized medical supplies sufficiently valuable, they reported, to finance the medical education Eberwein said he intensely desired.

The youth, identifying himself as the son of a Eugene businessman, held up a San Francisco boarding house, police said, and also passed spurious checks to purchase surgical instruments which were sold for cash.

Eberwein's pose was furthered by wearing a white interne's uniform and by carrying an impressive tome on cancer which helped him gain entrance to medical supply houses, police said.

Eberwein told police he is a native of Stuttgart, Germany, and came to this country 12 years ago with his father. He had in his possession a German iron cross which he told police had been awarded to his father.

French Admit Situation Most Desperate

Paris, June 13 (AP)—The defense in the battle for France is holding, military spokesmen declared today—holding under the heavy strain of new German divisions which have been combined with the old to make a total of 120 (about 1,800,000 men) striving to crush the French.

A French spokesman admitted, however, that the situation is desperate.

The French have no intention of fighting in Paris itself.

American-made bombing planes, whose efficiency, the spokesman said, has been proved, helped considerably in holding the German offensive.

French Admissions

The French acknowledged:

1. Establishment of a German bridgehead on the south bank of the Marne, near Chateau Thierry, about 45 miles east-northeast of Paris.

2. A German drive apparently aimed at capture of Le Havre, strategic port, about 110 miles northwest of Paris at the mouth of the Seine. The mails there were said to be moving toward the coast by way of Caudebec, about 25 miles east of Le Havre.

3. The loss of Reims (already claimed by the Germans), Reims about 80 miles northeast of Paris, was said to have been exposed to the flanking attacks of a whole mechanized army corps. Today tanks and armored cars were reported to have crashed head-on into Reims, forcing the French to retire.

Situation Serious

Everywhere along the northern front, from the channel coast and the valley of the Seine to Montmedy, northern anchor of the Maginot line, the situation is "serious," the spokesman acknowledged but he added that the line, though flexible, holds fast.

At several points small units have counter-attacked, he went on, showing that the spirit of the bearded French poilus and their bolstering British comrades-in-arms has not been broken.

Arrival of new planes, tanks and other armament would have an extremely important effect on the outcome of the battle for France, the spokesman declared, referring to the need for more aid from America.

French bombing planes have attacked the German cities of Mannheim, Neustadt and Frankfurt, a war ministry spokesman said.

Lines Holding

The spokesman said that the French line as a whole had held despite the fact that some units have not been relieved since the first day of the German offensive on the Somme nine days ago. German units, he said, have been relieved two or three times.

A big French counter-offensive is not yet possible, although some gains have been made by small counter-attacks, he added.

One of these was reported to have driven the Germans back five miles from the northern suburb of Paris in the region of Beaumont—only 12 miles from the fringe of the capital and 20 from its center.

The spokesman declared that the French would defend their lines in front of Paris and if forced back would defend them south of the capital. His statement was issued at Tours, one of the seats of the French government, and relayed through Paris.

No Paris Battle

"We do not want to battle in Paris itself," he said, explaining that the French forces would move back rather than risk destruction of the city. The Germans, he asserted, would be responsible for any destruction of the city.

He added that there would be no "official" removal of the Paris populace, although thousands had left on their own accord. All public services, such as gas, light, water and police, are still functioning in the city.

General Hering, military governor of Paris, left the city to take his army command after declaring Paris an open city with General Dentz in charge.

Notice of his action was posted on the city walls.

Continuation of— British Bombers

man airdrome at Vannes also was bombed, wrecking runways and hangars. German ground crews who rushed from their quarters were machine gunned by the diving planes.

Operating from bases in Egypt, the west coast provinces of Kenya and perhaps other fields, British bombers continued raids on Italian ships, airdromes, and land supply and troop centers in Libya on the Mediterranean. Italian-conquered Abyssinia, and Eritrea along the Red Sea. Blenheim bombers were credited with direct hits on airdromes, forts and munitions dumps in Eritrea, and at Diredda, Abyssinia. Mascara, near Assab, across the lower end of the Red Sea from the British protectorate of Aden, and objectives at the towns of Asmara and Gura were attacked. Ports and Libya also were bombed a second time. Meanwhile fliers from Egypt and British South Africa claimed they scored heavy blows in their raids yesterday on troop and supply bases in Abyssinia.

Monroe Doctrine Bill Approved

Washington, June 13 (AP)—The house rules committee today sent to the house floor the administration resolution reaffirming the Monroe Doctrine and warning against any attempts to transfer western hemisphere possessions as a result of the European war.

A similar resolution is pending in the senate.

The rules committee acted after Rep. Hamilton Fish (R-N.Y.), ranking minority member of the foreign affairs committee, told it that "we may get into all kinds of difficulties" if this resolution isn't passed.

He said the foreign affairs committee had agreed to discuss the possibility of revising the section providing that the United States would consult with other American republics in the event a transfer is attempted or appears likely. The committee, Fish said, wants to "clarify and strengthen" that section, probably to leave the United States complete freedom of action if immediate action should be necessary, without consultation.

"This resolution may prevent war," Fish told the rules committee.

House Debates Bridges Ouster

Washington, June 13 (AP)—The house, beginning debate on a bill to deport Harry R. Bridges, west coast CIO leader, was told today the Australian-born labor leader was "a trouble maker" who had no business in this country.

Rep. Colmer (D-Miss.), who thus labeled Bridges, called the bill unusual legislation designed to meet an unusual situation.

Representative Marcantonio (Al-N.Y.) read to the house a letter in which Bridges declared that passage of the bill would be a victory for powerful minorities and a defeat for American civil liberties.

Reminding the house that the government is spending billions for defense, Colmer said the nation should not wait to rid itself of subversive elements "until we are spilling the lifeblood of our citizens in defense of the country."

Rep. Fish (R-N.Y.) drew a burst of applause from both sides of the aisle when he said his only regret was that "we have delayed too long."

When Rep. Marcantonio (Al-N.Y.) protested that the legislation was setting the national government up against a man, Fish retorted that Bridges was "a symbol—a symbol of the fifth columnists in our midst."

Oregon Italians Pledge U. S. Loyalty

Portland, June 13 (AP)—President Amedeo F. Colistro of the Italian-American council of societies of Oregon today pledged loyalty of Italians in the state to the United States government, Colistro's statement said, in part:

"Our hearts are grieved by entrance of our native land into Europe's senseless war. Many whom we hold dear would have lived free of the fear of tragedy and death had not Mussolini led our people into war. We regret that he did so."

"We cherish more deeply our own blessings of peace and security and we pledge to our own American government all of the support and co-operation that will prove us worthy of American citizenship."

Bible Blackout Feared by Minister

Baltimore, June 13 (AP)—The Rev. Dr. Francis C. Stiffer fears a "Bible blackout."

Dr. Stiffer, editorial secretary of the American Bible society, told the Southern Baptist convention that he has stopped distribution by the British, Dutch, and Scottish Bible societies.

But millions in Europe and China have greater need than ever for Bibles, he said, asking for a "Bible Sunday" when each church would support the American society's work.

Portland, June 13 (AP)—City school officials were flooded today with requests for information about federal plans to train 2,000 war industries mechanics and 50 pilots in Portland beginning July 1.

Checks were being prepared today for the delegates, who receive five cents per mile for one way from home to the convention. Nearly 1,000 delegates and Granger visitors have been in attendance this week.

Putnam Talks On Education

Education must keep pace with changing conditions and "you cannot keep the one back there and the other up here," cautioned Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction as he addressed the Salem Lions club during today's luncheon. He asserted that the schools not only were teaching the "three R's" but that they were doing a better job of it. The schools, he said, had retained the fundamentals and in addition were teaching the youth of the land citizenship and all that the word implies.

Taking cognizance of the complaint in many quarters that the schools were not doing a good job, Putnam answered by pointing out that business concerns, in most instances, will not employ a person who has not had at least a high school education.

Putnam declared that the youth of today were not greatly different from those of the "good old days." "You cannot expect a young man or young woman of 17 to assume the responsibilities or show the intellect of the mature person," he added.

"Some people would keep education in the model T stage, while encouraging advancement in every other line of endeavor," Putnam declared as he pointed to the tremendous advances in machinery. In thinking, not only along mechanical lines but in philosophy and education.

Salem Guards Retain Whiskers

Camp Clatsop, June 13 (AP)—The bearded hordes of Salem's national guards escaped execution today under military code.

The bushy advertisements for the capital city's Centennial appeared destined for the shears and shaving brush until a legal minded sergeant got by with the proposal that the national guard was organized to fit into civilian life as much as possible.

Portland, June 13 (AP)—Evangeline E. Philbin, U. S. Civil Service commission representative, said today federal officials informed her of a need for technical workers for navy yards, army plants, air depots and other national defense agencies.

The government needs for work in the Bremerton navy yard where men can qualify as sheet metal workers, iron workers, boilermakers and structural iron men.

Help wanted at navy yards include loftmen, shipfitters, shipwrights, engineering draftsmen, toolmakers, coopermiths, instrument makers, naval architects, marine engineers, machinists, plate makers, chippers and calkers.
